"Two hundred years ago in China there was just such a craze about mate ural gas as we have in this country to-day. Gas wells were sunk with as much vim and vigor as the celestials were capable of, but owing to a gas explosion that killed several millions of people and tore up and destroyed a gas wells were sunk quite near to each other. Gas was lighted as soon as struck, as is done in this country. It is stated that one well with its unusual pressure, by induction or back draught, pulled down into the carth the burning gas of a smaller well, resulting in a dreadful explosion of a large district, destroving the inhabitants thereof. Lake Foo Chang rests on this district. The same catastrophe is imminent in this country unless the laws stall re-
