

VALUE AND NUMBER OF UTAH LIVESTOCK

Horses and Mules Aggregate 71,000 And Are Valued at Over Two Million.

BUT CATTLE ARE WORTH MORE

Value of Sheep is Still Higher, Reaching Nearly Four Millions of Dollars.

Secretary John J. Thomas of the state board of equalization today finished the compilation of the number of horses and mules, cattle and sheep in the State of Utah and their value for the current year. The tables which follow show that the horses and mules number, according to the assessment rolls, which of course, are considerably shy, 71,000. Their value is placed at \$2,139,240. The cattle number 21,639 and they are estimated to be worth \$3,519,580. A falling off in the number of sheep is shown. For instance, the state is credited with less than a million and a half head, the exact figures being, 1,453,926. They are assessed at nearly four millions of dollars, or to be specific, 3,519,580. The figures giving these figures are found below:

CRITICALLY ILL.

Reed T. Cannon Not Expected to Survive the Day.

Reed T. Cannon, son of the late President George Q. Cannon, and brother of Dr. William T. Cannon, the well known local practitioner, is critically ill at the home of his mother, Mrs. Eliza L. T. Cannon, on Cannon farm. His condition is such that but slight hopes are entertained for his recovery. Mr. Cannon has been ill for two years, but not until recently did his condition become alarming, complications arising which affected his heart and made recovery, so far as his skill is concerned, well nigh impossible. This afternoon he was not expected to survive the day. Mr. Cannon is 30 years of age and has a wife and two children, besides a host of relatives and friends who will be shocked to hear of his condition.

KILLED BY A TRAIN.

Dead Body of Unknown Man Found on San Pedro Track.

(Special to the "News.") Provo, Aug. 2.—This morning a Sheriff Clinger of Lakeview telephoned Sheriff Harmon that the dead body of an unknown man had been found on the San Pedro track, at a point known as the Lakeview crossing, five miles north of Provo. The body was horribly mangled, and it was evident that it had been dragged a considerable distance, as the clothes of the unfortunate victim were torn to shreds. The man was poorly clad, had a brown moustache and is about 35 years of age. A letter found in a frog a short distance from the body and dated Grand Junction, Colo., July 21, or some date after the 20th, bore the signature of Louis Braun, Fruita, Colo., and in case of non-delivery was to be returned to C. O. Hansen, Progress Grocery & Bakery, Grand Junction.

A NEW BRITISH SUBMARINE.

The drawing shows one of the new submarines ordered by the British naval authorities and recently launched at Portsmouth. It differs in many particulars from anything yet accepted by the admiralty and is the first to be built. In length it approaches the dimensions of a destroyer.
