The trial of Thomas Hall and Mar-garet Graham Houston for attempting to murder the wife of Hall commenced at Timaru on October 11th. The case has attracted great attention throughout the colony, on account of the atro-cious nature of the crime and of the position in which the parties to it had moved. The trial concluded on Oc-tober 19th, and resulted in the conviction of Hall and in the acquittal of Miss Houston, whom the jury declared to leave the box without a stain upon her character. Opinion is unanimous in favor of the verdict in Hall's case, as the evidence was overwhelming that he the evidence was overwhelming that he had commenced to take measures to destroy his wife's life shortly after their marriage, and that he bad admin-istered repeated doses of poison short-ly after her confinement. He was sen-tenced to imprisonment for life. Ever since the apprehension of Hall on the charge of attempting to murder his wife, rumors have been circulated that Captain Cain, Mrs. Hall's father, had died by poison. The death took place last January. Some short time since the remains were exhumed and certain portions subjected to chemical examportions subjected to chemical examnation. It appears that antimony was found in large quantities. An inquest is now being held, and it is thought that Hall will be arraigned on the charge of murder. FUI.
