Republican Senators will not filibuster against the Senate organization to-morrow, but they will require the enforcement of the rules. Under the rules, unless unanimous consent is given, committees are chosen by ballot, and it takes two ballots for each committee. By this process progress will be slow. There is considerable dissatisfaction among some democrats at the place assigned them and a good deal of grumbling in the caucus yesterday. When Camden, of West Virginia, was proposed for the finance committee there was great indignation. Camden is connected with the Standard Oil Company, is president of a national bank, and represents the Baltimore and Ohio railroad. Democrats in caucus declared that to put him on the finance committee was simply giving monopolies increased power. After some fuss Camden was taken off the committee. Democrats have no intimation from Mahone, but most of them give him up to the republicans. Republican senators openly declare their purpose to reorganize when their vacancies are filled if democrats crowd the present organization. This is generally considered to mean that Mahone has indicated to republicans his purpose to vote and act with them. The feeling among democrats to-day is that they will not hold the organization long even if they get it.

Democratic senators who will remain after adjournment have been notified of another caucus to-morrow morning. It is rumored that leading republicans and democrat senators have conferred with the view of arriving at a settlement of the organization question amicably, and the matter will be acted on to-morrow. The chairmen of the republicans' and democrats' caucuses have been in consultation this afternoon.

Representative Pacheco and ex-Senator Booth, left Washington this morning for a trip to the City of Mexico, and thence by leisurely progress to California via Guadaluara and Tepica.

President and Mrs. Garfield received to-day the diplomatic corps and ladies with their families; members of the present and Hayes' Cabinets, with their ladies, were also present.

Secretary of War Lincoln to-morrow takes charge of his Department.

Secretary Windom says it has been decided to further consider the pending National Bank question at a Cabinet meeting to-morrow, and that it is very probable a decision will be made immediately thereafter.

Five million one hundred and thirty-eight thousand two hundred and fifty-one dollars in gold bullion, was transferred from the New York assay office to the Philadelphia Mint for coinage into eagles and half eagles.

Secretary Kirkwood informed the Uncomphagre Ute chiefs that no change could be made in the terms of the recent agreement. If sufficient agricultural lands cannot be found in the Grand River Valley they will be selected in Utah.

Postmaster General James was serenaded to-night, and paid a high tribute to Prest. Garfield. Ex-Postmaster Maynard warmly eulogized his successor.

**NEW YORK, 10.**—The Commercial Bulletin St. Louis: The grain trade is quite jubilant over the increasing importance of that city as an exporter by the water route, as illustrated by such incidents as the departure the other day of the steamer Oakland for New Orleans with the largest tow of grain that ever descended the Mississippi, being a total of 200,479,000 pounds. The

single cargo, we are told, would require 700 freight cars to have carried it, or 35 separate freight trains and engines. Freights to New Orleans are much below those for which the railroads can afford to carry. The cost of transferring the grain from the barges to the steamers at New Orleans, with enhanced marine insurance and various other incidentals, brings up the total to a point which, other things considered, gives Mississippi exporters no advantage over the Atlantic seaports.

A meeting will be held here on the 15th inst., in behalf of the Indian education on the basis of the work begun at Hampton Institute, Virginia. Among the speakers are Carl Schurz, Rev. Drs. Hitchcock and Potter. Miles will be present.

The Times says: The theme of the meeting will be what may be fairly called a new idea. The new idea is that it is cheaper to teach a young Indian than to fight an old one. The secret is not education, but separation from their old associations and placing them under different surroundings. Education in the moral atmosphere of the east is what seems to be needed, and what Hampton Institute affords, as cheaply as possible, and under government patronage. The institute is not, however, a government school. It is a private corporation, dependent on private support. Thirteen thousand dollars have been spent in buildings for Indian boys, and now it is thought to raise some \$150,000 for schools for Indian girls. The scholars are all ready. It is hoped that President Garfield can lay the corner-stone on May 19th, the institute's anniversary.

The Herald's Dublin special says: The coercion net is hauling in its victims from the south and west at a rate which must be highly satisfactory to the authorities. To-day, some of the most prominent Forster's "village tyrants" were deprived of their liberty. It is a remarkable fact that all arrests have been effected so far without any local disturbance and little excitement. The most notable arrest is that of the celebrated Scab Nally, one of the defendant's in the State trials, who was taken at his father's house in Balla. Mr. Nally recently went to London intending to go to the Cape and join the Boers, but he changed his mind and is assured comfortable quarters for 18 months. Those who reached Dublin up to 7 o'clock, were Martin Chatterin, President of the Loughrea, County Galway, branch; Joseph Dalton, of Milltown, near Clonmorris, charged, inciting a mob to attack a police hut; Patrick Kearney, farmer, Thurlongmere; and Patrick Furce, president of the Armagh-down league, County Galway. Four prisoners came in from County Leitrim, all charged with taking part in a riotous assembly. They are Chas. Nelson, a farmer, of Drumshire; Matthew Malley, of Drumkirran; Patrick McManus, a publican, of Drumshambo; J. McMorrow, a national schoolmaster, from Dowra. Michael Ginley and Michael Flynn were brought from Ennis, County Clare, Edward Hussey from Castle Island, P. D. Kenny from Ballymacken, Kerry, and another from Doola, County Limerick. In addition to these, two arrests were reported from Castle, County Clare, the names are not given. There are also three more arrests in County Limerick. None of the prisoners so far have acquired more than a local reputation, except Boyton, Walsh and Nally. The last named gentleman whose speeches were notorious for their recommendations to give the landlords "pills," recently had his photograph taken standing beside a ditch with his rifle in his hand and a pile of cartridges at his feet. The picture was labelled "Nally's pills."

Parnell promised to attend the great tenant right demonstration at Enniskillen on Monday. The Ulster Land League is making great preparations for the meeting. The precautions at armories and magazines of volunteers are being gradually increased.

Twenty warrants for arrests in Westmeath County are issued. In view of the conclusion of the debates on the coercion bill, extreme liberals pressed a new policy on the Parnellites. It is proposed that by studiously moderate opposition in committee of supply, home-rulers should endeavor to obliterate the strong feeling prevailing against their conduct in England. This accomplished, in the event of the land bill not being thoroughly satisfactory, certain liberals will undertake to participate in an appeal to public opinion in the provinces.

**CINCINNATI, 10.**—At Cylthina, Ky., last night, Sallie Carr wound up a day's quarrel and convivial drunk by cutting Rene Fowler's throat, causing instant death. Both were negro women.

**At Farmer's, Rowan County, Ky.,** yesterday evening, John C. Lightfoot received a shot in the thigh from McDermott's pistol, and sent a ball from his own pistol through McDermott's heart, causing instant death. There was an old grudge. Both were young men.

**DUBUQUE, Iowa, 10.**—A sad case of fatal poisoning occurred at Elkador, Clayton County, where Mrs. B. Vines, in company with her sister, went out to tea and ate some canned salmon. Mrs. Vines died from the effects of the poison which the salmon had produced by corroding the can. The salmon was tainted and the can was turned green in consequence.

President Brand telegraphs that Donald Currie, member of the British Parliament, who has before rendered assistance to the government in the settlement of the South African disputes, expects to reach the frontier on the 13th inst. He has written Joubert to assert where Joubert and Jauner could meet him. He hoped a short extension of the armistice will be made if necessary to effect a settlement.

A dispatch from Prospect Hill stated Joubert has sent 300 men to Utrecht who have completely cleared the town and district of inhabitants loyal to the British. It is reported that Joubert ordered all homesteads of loyal Boers in Utrecht district to be burned. This has excited the deepest indignation at Prospect Hill, being considered a breach of the spirit of the armistice.

The 83d foot detachment of dragoons, mounted infantry and a battery of artillery have reached Newcastle.

**KANSAS CITY, Mo., 10.**—The greatest conflagration known in Kansas City for many years, occurred this morning on Union Avenue, between Mulberry and Santa Fe Streets, by which was destroyed that part of the magnificent new block of buildings occupied by Woodward, Faxon & Co., wholesale druggists, Kelly, Willis & Co., wholesale hardware; Ogleborg & Co., wholesale grocers. The flames were first seen to burst from a rear window of Faxon & Co.'s. By the time the firemen arrived, at 4 o'clock, the roof and windows glared terrifically with leaping flames. A series of explosions numbering not less than 75, took place, caused by cans of gunpowder in the establishment of Ogleborg & Co., and barrels of coal oil in the drug house of Woodward, Faxon & Co. These explosions were loud enough to be heard through the city, and by families two miles from the scene of the conflagration. The water pressure, which should have been 90 pounds to the square inch, was insufficient to carry the stream to the second story windows. Woodward, Faxon & Co.'s, loss \$85,000; insured for \$60,000; Ogleborg & Co.'s, loss \$80,000; insured for \$75,000; Kelly, Willis & Co.'s, loss \$80,000; fully insured. The buildings were owned by Leach, Olmstead & Hall, and valued at \$50,000, on which the insurance was \$28,000.

**Rosita, Col., 10.**—Early this morning a fire broke out in Miller's grocery store, and spreading destroyed the entire business portion of the city, with stocks of merchandise, including the postoffice and contents. The fire was evidently the work of an incendiary, an out-house, ice houses and the floor of a grocery store having been saturated with coal oil. The outhouses were first discovered to be on fire and immediately after the flames broke out in the interior of the store, and an explosion soon occurred spreading fire brands in all directions. The water supply from wells was soon exhausted, and the flames were allowed to take their course. The loss is estimated at \$120,000.

**CHICAGO, 10.**—A mass meeting of sympathizers with the Dutch Boers in Transvaal was held to-night in the First Dutch Reformed Church. There are 9,000 pure Dutchmen in the city, and they were largely in preponderance at the meeting, which was a large, orderly and determined body of men. Speeches were made and resolutions adopted declaring that the English nation were determined to conquer the Boers in South Africa only because they are naturally free men, and tendering cordial sympathy to their countrymen in the Transvaal, who are heroically vindicating their right to freedom against the power of England.
