LOCAL BRIEFS.

Mrs. Oglesby Recovering.—Mrs. J. E. Oglesby has sufficiently recovered from the operation for a broken limb to be removed to her Sixth East street home.

Drop in Meat Prices.—Local meat market men promise a drop in prices of chops and steaks in two weeks, with probabilities of a further drop later on.

Will Return to Salt Lake.—Dr. J. C. Hanchett, who formerly practiced medicine in this city, and later removed to San Francisco, is to return to Salt Lake Aug. 1.

To Entertain Maj. Gen. Bell.—Plans are being made for entertaining Maj. Gen. J. Franklin Bell by the Commercial club, on the occasion of his visit to this city and Fort Douglas.

Really Transferred.—The Silver Bros. have transferred to the Latter-day Saints corporation 69 1/2 @ 330 feet on North Temple between West Temple and First West streets, for \$26,000.

Dies of Appendicitis.—Edwin E. Hatch of this city died yesterday of appendicitis. Until Mrs. Hatch and daughter who are in Dallas, Texas, arrive in this city no funeral arrangements will be made.

Garbage Ordinance Held Up.—Mayor Thompson has approved all the matters passed upon by the city council Monday night, including the new garbage ordinance and the new pure food ordinance. These have been held up by him for further consideration.

Sings for Elks and Fire Laddies.—W. A. Knox, a local baritone singer of note, gave much pleasure yesterday afternoon, to a number of Elks by singing for them at the club. He afterwards gave the fire laddies a season of enjoyment by singing for them at fire hall. One of the most effective numbers he gave was "Sing Me To Sleep."

Must Dip Sheep.—The state board of sheep commissioners has issued an order requiring dipping of sheep between Sept. 20 and Nov. 1; and where there is scab, there must be two dippings. Rams brought into the state within the date mentioned must be twice dipped, unless previously given a clean bill of health from their point of shipment.

Holiday at Postoffice.—The Salt Lake postoffice observed holiday hours today. The general delivery, registry, forwarding, box and inquiry departments were closed from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m., the money order department remaining closed all day. Carriers will make one delivery and collection throughout the city with a hotel delivery and collection at 8 p. m.

Fell Into a Hole.—Gustave A. Johnson has filed suit in the district court against the Rio Grande Western Railway company to recover damages in the sum of \$6,095 for personal injuries alleged to have been received by him on April 1, 1906, while employed by the company as a painter. Owing to the poorly lighted condition of the place where he was working he alleged that he fell into a hole and broke his left leg and otherwise injured himself.

Settled Out of Court.—The \$50,000 breach of promise suit filed by Amanda Hoelst against James Hoelst, a mining man of this city, a few days ago has been settled out of court and dismissed upon motion of the fair plaintiff. Miss Hoelst lives at Mackay, Idaho, where James was engaged in the mining business. She alleged that he ruined her under promise of marriage, and that she then found out that he had a family in this city and could not marry her. She settled the case for a money consideration but what the amount is could not be ascertained.
