THE DYNAMITE-PNEUMATIC. NEW FOUR-INCH GUN WHICH IS TO

REVOLUTIONIZE WARFARE.

A machine that looks like a fortyinch brass pipe mounted on a steel
girder such as lie on the elevated railroad pillars, rested in the centre of the
machine shop of the Delamater Iron
works. The machine is the barrel and
earriage of the four-inch dynamitepneumatic gun, which, when completed, is expected to sink, on occasionthe largest man-of-war afloat and annihilate its crew. The gun is constructed of brass and steel, fitted in
the most accurate manner at the joints,
and capable of sustaining a pressure
of 1,000 pounds to the square inch. It
weighs but a lon, and may be carried
by a small gun-boat.

The projectile is nothing more nor
less than a dynamite cartridge encased
in soft metal with a shell of brass and
fitted with a fwooden tail. It weighs
about 100 pounds. The soft metal filling protects the dynamite from ordinary accidents. But when the projectile, flying at speed, strikes, head on,

ary accidents. But when the projectile, flying at speed, strikes, head on, against a resisting surface, a hard metal pin embedded in the soft metal and not touching the dynamite is forced into the fulminate at the head of the cartridge and discharges the dynamite. In order that wind currents may not interfere in the precision of the firing, the center of gravity is near the forward end of the projectile. The wooden tail acts as a sudder, the wind veering the tail around and throwing the head into the wind in proportion to the strength of the current, thus maintaining an absolute straight coursely.

The gun is constructed with a powerful air chamber, capable of storing an immense force of compressed air.

BISASTROUS FIRES IN ROME AND

An immense force of compressed air. The gunner sights with telescope sights with thair lines, and with the pressure of a finger discharges the compressed air into the barrel, and starts the projectile on its flight. The great length of the tube is required to economize all the force of the air, which is less rapid in its action than gunpowder. "This gun," said Mr. Hinsdale, who is superintending the construction, "will throw the cartridge three miles with gunpowder.
