PALMA WILL MAKE NO CONCESSIONS

Government Has Made All the Offers to the Rebels That it Possibly Can Make.

THE AMERICAN INTERVENTION

Has Not Been Considered-Talk in Havana is of Peace Through Compromises.

Havana, Sept. 3 .- President Palma, in an interview tonight with the Associated Press, put an end to the expectation that he would make any concessions whatever to the rebels beyond the offer of pardon already extended. The president said he could not possibly make such concessions either now or hereafter, and could not see in any event what the government could offer beyond what has already been done.

American intervention, the president said, had not been considered, because the government believed it could end the insurrection without assistance.
Concerning the reported quarrel with Vice President Mendez Capote and the rumors that the latter is trying to have him deposed, President Palma said: "Such a report is a malicious slander on a distinguished patriot and loyal friend of the administration and my personal friend."

No fighting of consequence is report. ed. The principal engagement reported today is one in which Col. Valle, nmanding a force which sallied a week ago from Cienfuegos, encountered this morning at Cumanayuga, Santa Clara province, a force of insurgents, whom he scattered, taking 10 prison-

ers, arms and horses.

Twelve hundred militia, cavalry and infantry, have been organized at Clenfuegos to defend the city. Pits have been dug and wire fortifications erected in the weak portions of the city.

The boys at the reform school at Guanajay today endeavored to escape and join the insurgents, but were re-captured and returned to the institu-

A hand of insurgents is supposed to be between Santiago and Guantanaco. Peace through political compromises is the sole topic of conversation today in all the best informed circles where it is recognized that this is the only way of bringing about a settlement of Cuba's internal troubles. Therefore there is a meral disposition not to agree with the stand taken by President Palms that the government should not treat with the insurgents upon the basis of arranging a compromise and the president is understood to have al-ready modified his attitude to the extent that he has no objections to pribelieved beyond further doubt that an attempt to reach peace through some compromise will now be made.

NO INTERVENTION.

Washington, Sept. 3 .- Emphatic denial is made at the state department of all reports that any movement is in progress looking to intervention in Cuban affairs. There have been no communications between the president and the department on this sub

REBEL LEADER'S VIEW.

New York, Sept. 4.—A cable dispatch to a morning paper from Havana says: Gen. Mario Menocal, who, it has been said, is the rebels' candidate for the presidency, and is now in Santlago, says that he is ready to come to Havana and mediate for peace, without any thought of personal ambition. The veterans of the late war are eagerly

expecting him. The plan now is that Menocal, Ce-breco and other leading veterans go to Pinar del Rio, see Pino Guerra and induce him to surrender, accepting pardon as the only concession that President Palma will make. But it is not thought likely that Guerra will consent, as he is sending letters to friends throughout the country saying that he would rather die than accept Palma's

General Rafael Montalvo, secretary of state, who is in charge of the war, says that if the government should compromise with the insurgents it vould encourage endless revolutions.

London, Sept. 3 .-- Four men were killed and eight were seriously injured today by an explosion on board the Russian armored cruiser Ruhlk, which is being built at the Vickers Maxims works at Barrow. The accident is at-tributed to the contact of a lighted naptha lamp with inflammable gases in a tank where the men were work-

REV. DR. CRAPSEY'S CASE.

New York, Sept. 4.- The case of Rev. Dr. Algernon S. Crapsey will come up today before the court of review of the Protestant Episcopal church for determination whether or not his sentence to suspension on the charge of hearsay shall be upheld. Prominent ministers and laymen arrived yesterday to attend the trial. Rev. Dr. Crapsey, rector of St. Andrew's church, Rochester, the da-fendant, was accompanied by his lawyer, Jas. B. Perkins. It is said they will appeal for an adjournment on the grounds that Dr. Crapsey has not had time to prepare his defense, but thi action will be strenuously opposed.

GOLDFIELD SUN WINS.

Mine Owners and Citizens Will Compel Merchants to Advertise in It.

Goldfield, Nev., Sept. 3.—The Goldfield Sun appeared on the streets today and in spite of the threats of the Industrial Workers of the World there has been no disturbance.

The mineowners and citizens have

taken the matter in hand and a committee representing these two interests has notified the merchants that they are expected to advertise in the Sun in spit of the boycott declared by the union. If a merchant does not adver-tise in the paper, the committee has announced that it will take steps 10 compel them to.

CONSPIRACY SUPPRESSED.

In Province of Ilocos Norte, Island of Luzon.

Manila, Sept. 3.-A conspiracy has been suppressed in the province of Ilocos Norte on the island of Luzon, by the prompt action of Gov. Florey arresting 150 Filipinos said to be impli cated. Documents were captured which show that the Burdo brothers were the principal conspirators and hatched the plot while serving a sentence in jail where they enticed the sympathy and support of fellow prisoners and commenced a revolutionary organization. The leaders were arrested. The papers showed that while the followers organized ostensibly for a revolu-tion, robbery was the real object.

TERRORISTS IN THE ARMY.

Odessa, Sept. 2.-A terrorist organ-ization among the troops, alming at the extermination of all the authori-ties, was discovered here last night Extensive correspondence with revolutionary bodies was seized, and 14 officers and one army surgeon were arrested on the charge of having co-ducted secret meetings of soldiers.

POWER HOUSE BURNED.

Kansas City, Sept. 2.—The power house of the Kansas City and Leavenworth Electric Railway company at Walcott, Kan., 15 miles west of this city, was burned tonight, with all its valuable machinery. Loss \$200,600.

WAGE SCALE AGREED UPON.

Helena, Sept. 3 .- An agreement as to wages was reached today between representatives of the United Mine Workers of the district comprising Montana and Wyoming and the operators to govern for the next year, the result being practically unchanged. This agreement precludes any possibility of a strike during the year of any question affecting wages.

OREGON BANK LOOTED.

Portland, Sept. 3 .- A special to the Oregonian from Rainier, Or., says:
While Cashier P. W. Van Aucher lay
bound hand and foot, gagged and tied
to a table in a back room, two bandits leisurely looted the State bank of Rainler in broad day light this afternoon. It was two hours before their unfor-tunate victim was able to free himself sufficiently to give the alarm and in the meantime the robbers had made good their escape, taking with them between \$2,000 and \$2,500 in gold coin; silver and bank notes lying on the counter were untouched.

HURT BY BOMB EXPLOSION. St. Louis, Sept. 2.-Two men were
