Captured During a Fierce Engagement Off Tripoli-Baltimore Man Seeks Information.

In a letter to Gen. Oswald Tilghman, secretary of state of Maryland, and a cousin of Kenneth C. Kerr of this city. A. C. Trippe, a prominent resident of Baltimore, Maryland, asks for information about a historic sword which was taken by Lieut. John Trippe, a dead relative, during the war of Tripoli. The sword, whose present whereabouts has been a mystery to Mr. Trippe and other prominent residents of Baitimore and Maryland has been for years hang-ing in Mr. Kenneth Kerr's home, 1111 Eleventh East street, in Sait Lake. The relic was once the sword of the pirate-captain of a Turkish ship which was fought and defeated by an Amerpirate-captain of a Turkish ship which was fought and defeated by an Amer-ican ship, of which John Trippe was licutensnt; in the war of Tripoll. Mr. Trippe, the writer of the letter men-tioned, asks for information about the family of the late John Bozman Kerr, at one time a congressman from Mary-iond and later bistorian of that state.

land and later historian of that state. The late J. B. Kerr is a grandfather of Kenneth Kerr. Mr. Kerr has written to Maryland explaining how the sword came into the possession of the Kerr family. The relic was given to the late J. B. Boxman late in the fifties by a friend, presumably one of the family, and was kept for years in the Kerr family home in Washington, D. Trippe bested the sea-robber and dur-ing the souffle for life, the Turk was killed with the very weapon he had used so murderously.

used so murderously. The facts connected with the war of The facts connected with the war of Tripoli and events leading up to it are familiar to every school student. For many years Tripoli and other towns on the northern coast of Africa were the homes of sea pirates. The pirates were Mohammedans. For years they had followed the practise of sending out fast safiling vessels heavily armed to capture Christian ships on their way to and from Mediterranean points. Eu-ropean nations were unable to break this system of piracy and European countries and America paid rulers in Algiers and Tripoli vast sums of money for protection to commerce and for the liberation of sallors carried to Africa and kept in abject slavery until heavy ransons were paid. During Washing-ton's and Adams' presidencies America was unable to fight the pirates on ac-count of having no ships with which to count of having no ships with which to wage war. is given authority to enforce equitable rates. The attorney for the commission informs this committee that the commission has authority to protect Salt Lake City on the rates from Utah mines, unless the railroad involved conines all its coal business to this state Should the railroad pursue this policy, the rates to Salt Lake City from coal mines in Wyoming, regulated by the commission, will be such that the Utah roads will be forced to meet this com-petition. It therefore follows that Salt Lake City will enjoy fair rates on coal. "One independent coal company with "One independent coal company with strong backing has already been launched, and others are in prospect. The railroads will be forced to give them facilities and fair rates, and the outlook, therefore, is that Salt Lake City in the future will have plenty of coal at low prices."

Mr. Holmes owns property on the northeast corner of Second South and State streetsan ideal spot for an office building. Mr. Holmes has not given the word yet which will make the contemplated structure a certainty, the plans and structure a certainty, the plans and perspective have just arrived from the east. These promise that when Mr. Holmes does say the word Salt Lake will get an office structure which will have every feature known to modern building. Mr. Holmes' prop-erty on the corner mentioned has a frontage of 162 feet on State street and 116 feet on Second South. This ground can accommodate a large 10-story structure. The plans show an arrangement of offices which will do away with "inside" rooms. An interior court will make this elimination pos-sible no matter how many offices are built. ## Sits in an Adjoining Room When Daughter Takes the Fatal Draft That Ends Her Troubles.

Despondent because she could not ecure employment, after persistent injunctions from her father that she must do so, Carrie McCloskey, aged 30 years, committed suicide last evening, by swallowing the contents of a two ounce bottle of carbolic acid. The deed was done while her younger sister sat within a few feet of her, and while the aged father sat reading his

while the aged father sat reading his Eible in an adjoining room. The McCloskeys had resided in Salt Lake several years, coming here from Chicago, after an estrangement be-tween husband and wife. Carrie and Maud followed their father and the three lived at 736 Poplar arcade. Mc-Closkey is a day laborer and is sald to earn only small wages. The young-er daughter has been in ill health, and is taking a course of study with a local school of stenography. It is sald that the father told the elder daughter that she must work for her own support, and the girl found em-ployment until about Christmas time, when she returned home and asked to be permitted to remain thera, but, it is alleged, her father insisted on her again going to work. The girl became more despondent each day. Yesterday afternoon she went up town, but re-turned in the avening. When hed time! more despondent each day. Yesterday afternoon she went up town, but re-turned in the evening. When bed time cfine the sisters prepared to retire. The younger one returned to her lessons for a few minutes when she heard a shrick from the other, who exclaimed: "I have done it at last," at the same time throwing herself face downward on the bed. Father and sister rushed to her only to find her at the same time throwing herself face downward on the bed. Father and sister rushed to her, only to find her writhing in agony, with an ompty bottle lying by her side. Neighbors came in and everything possible was done for the unfortunate girl pend-ing the arrival of Dr. Thome. The latter ordered the sufferer to be con-veyed to the emergency hospital at the city jail, and there physicians worked over her for hours, yut death ensued about 11:50 o'clock, nearly three hours after the fatal draft was taken. taken.
