Any importations for depreciated cur-rency in the absence of a currency cer-tificate issued by the American consul. The importers claimed in their pro-test that the goods were purchased with the depreciated paper currency of Greece, and that it should have been taken by the collector at a discount of about 62 per cent, as compared with the standard coin, drachma. Judge Somerville pointed out, how-ever, the importance of obtaining con-sular certificates to show that such de-preciation is recognized officially and must be attached to the invoice, as re-quired by the consular regulations. The collector's valuation, which was based on tables compiled by the director of the mint, was therefore upheld.
