LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRE.—The great sensational drama, "The Time" will be presented at the Theatre to-night. This play has been going at considerable expense, and will be put on the boards with new scenery, mechanical arrangements and appointments. The piece is strongly cast, including the strength of the company. Lovers of the excitingly sensational will enjoy a treat in witnessing the performance to night. The bill should draw a good house.

MAYOR WELLS ARRESTED.—At twenty minutes past three this afternoon, just as we were going to press, U. S. Marshal Patrick served a writ upon and arrested Mayor D. H. Wells, on a charge of "obstruction and unlawful exaltation."

If the grasshoppers begin their ravages in the mountains, they won't end there. Utah and Montana have raised good crops the past season.

WHAT IS IT ALL ABOUT?—It said the soldiers who arrived in the city on Sunday night from Fort Steele, were called suddenly, by dispatch from the war department, to move this way. If this be true, what does it mean? Was it in accordance with a demand of the gophers of the corrupt ring? APPLICATIONS FOR LAND PATENTS APPROVED.—A dispatch dated New York, Oct. 2nd, says:

"The commissioner of the general land office has approved the applications for patenting the cash entries arising from the following townships in the Territory of Utah, Kayville, Springville, American Fork city, Bountiful, Centerville, Santaquin, Cedar Fort, Payson city, Mona, Ephraim city, Nephi and Levan."

THE LIQUOR CASE.—Yesterday in the Supreme Court, the appeal case of Engelbrecht, Salt Lake City, was decided, and the judgment of the District Court affirmed. The case will be appealed to the Supreme Court of the United States.

OUR DELEGATE TO CONGRESS.—We were gratified at receiving a call yesterday afternoon from our Delegate, Hon. Wm. H. Hooper, who, with his family, has been passing the past eight weeks at Soda Springs. The waters of Soda have an excellent effect upon his and family's health. Hon. Mr. Hooper, if his present health continues, will be in excellent condition to enter upon the labors of the next session of Congress, and to render those important services for which during so many years he has been conspicuous.

The three gentlemen above named were old school-mates and comrades in the agricultural line with our respected citizen, Thos. King, Esq., of the 17th Ward. Mr. King is 73 years of age, and has been the living of a noted circle of Essex and Cambridge farmers and graziers.

GREAT EXCITEMENT.—CIVIL WAR IN SALT LAKE!—THE GENTILES AND MOHAWKS!—A report comes to us just as we were going to press, of an outbreak and open rupture in Utah to-day. Our old friend Korry, who is now at Ogden, tells us that Brigham Young was to be arrested this morning on an indictment for perjury, but he has not learned whether the arrest was made or not. There is evidently great excitement there.

Late.—Korry telegraphs as follows at 5:30 o'clock p.m.

The editor of the Review (the Gentile paper at Salt Lake—Em.) has just this morning arrived here with his family, and his paper is suspended.

The Governor and his family have left Salt Lake at noon. The Gentiles who can get away are leaving with their families as possible.

Brigham wanted to be tried to-day, but we don't know what has been decided. The Mormons are powerful and only two weeks ago they bought a large lot of needles from at auction at Camp Douglas. The other in command did not know what he was doing. They say that all the Mormons are armed with needles, and some have fine rounds of cartridges, and are very fond with their threats.

Somebody will have to pay the costs of all these unrighteous proceedings, with interest too.
