He was 30 years of age and leaves a wife (whe is in a delicate state of health) and five children.

Deceased was the son of Marion H. Brady and the grandson of the late Silas Richards who many years ago was the assessor and collector of Salt Lake County, and also the first appointed Bishop of Union Fort. The funeral services were held today (April 12) in the meeting-house at Union at l o'clock p. m.
