Raymond plays "Col. Sellers" to-night.

Provo is to be connected telephonically with Salt Lake, at an early day.

John C. Graham, Esq., editor of the *Enquirer*, was in the city yesterday.

Preparations for the citizens' celebration of the glorious Fourth are booming.

President A. O. Smoot came up from Provo last night and returned this morning.

Judge A. C. Pyper and Dr. S. B. Young are expected home from the east to-night.

The excursion to San Francisco leaves Ogden on the 30th inst., and returns on the 31st of July.

The machinery for silk weaving sent for by the Utah County Silk Association, some time ago, arrived yesterday.

Mother Cluff, formerly of Provo, but more recently of Pima, Arizona, died at the latter place on the 5th inst., in the 68th year of her age.

The Old Folks' Excursion was delayed for over an hour at Kayville yesterday morning, through an accident to the engine of the train.

The Bishops' Wards, included in each municipal ward, are to have contiguous locations at the grand entertainment at Locust Grove, on the 4th of July.

"Liberty Park" is to be the name of the grounds recently purchased by the City, upon which the celebration proceedings of the 4th of July are to be held.

The Locust Grove, where the celebration is to be held, is now marked off and allotted to the various wards. The work of decoration, etc., can commence at once.

A two-year-old son of Cyrus Man, of Nephi, was drowned in a creek near his parent's residence on Thursday last. His neck was broken by being swept down stream against a dam below.

Franklin Morley, a drummer boy in the Ogden band, was accidentally shot in the foot yesterday morning, by the accidental discharge of a pistol which fell from his pocket while he was running.

The only case in the District Court today was that of the Pleasant Valley C. and C. Company vs. the Utah and Pleasant Valley Railway Co.; motion to dissolve attachment allowed. Exception.

On the 15th inst., an eight-year-old son of Enoch Ludlow, of Benjamine, while descending Payson Canyon with his father, on a load of wood, was killed by the upsetting of the wagon on a steep driveway, being crushed by the falling load.

Alarming Accident.—The Ogden *Herald* states that yesterday forenoon Mr. Murdoch, of Harrisville, was driving to Ogden to visit the Old Folks' Excursion. He had his wife and two children—an eight-year-old girl and a nursing baby—with him in the vehicle, when all of a sudden the horses took fright at something and ran away with the wagon.

While the wagon was drawn rapidly over a deep water ditch, the thin side of one of the wheels came loose, and by the violent jolt resulting to the wagon, all the inmates were thrown out. The baby was hurled a distance of two rods, but when picked up by the terrified parents was found uninjured, with the exception of some slight bruises on one arm. The father had the wheels run over one of his legs, without, however, sustaining any fracture or other serious injury; the mother was hurt in the back, but not dangerously. The girl fared worse. She was precipitated from the wagon, and alighting on her knees, received so violent a concussion that she lay for hours in a comatose condition. As soon as Mr. Murdoch got up and around, he availed himself of the first opportunity to send for Dr. John Driver who at once repaired to Harrisville, where he found the parties in the condition above described and administered to them the necessary medical aid. All except the girl are out of danger.

The I. O. O. F. Excursion.—The

Old Folks' Excursion to Garfield Landing, yesterday, was a very pleasant and successful affair. The members of the Order and their invited friends, to the number of about 300 souls, on a chartered special train, of six cars accompanied by Croxall's brass band and Olsen's string band, left the Utah and Nevada Depot at nine a. m., and within an hour from the time of starting were at their destination on the southern shore of the Lake. The forenoon was happily spent in bathing, boat-riding, dancing, etc., and between 12 and 1 o'clock the company were called together in the spacious bower, where Gen. E. M. Barum addressed them, giving a brief historical account of the rise and progress of the Odd Fellow organization in Great Britain and in Utah. At the conclusion of his remarks, loud calls were made for F. Auerbach, Esq., Grand Master of the Utah Lodge, who, in a neatly worded response, dwelt upon the benefits and objects of the society. A recess was then taken until half past two o'clock, during which a number of the excursionists partook of a sumptuous dinner, prepared by Captain Douris on board the *General Garfield*. The remainder of the day was spent in sports and amusements similar to those of the forenoon, and at 5 o'clock the entire company boarded the train for home. The music rendered by the Croxall Band on the train to and from the Lake, and at intervals during the day, was truly superb, as was that of Olsen's excellent quadrille combination. For the success of the entire affair, special credit is due to Mr. E. H. Murphy, Master of Ceremonies, and to his corps of efficient assistants.

"Fresh, the American."—This eccentric comedy was presented last evening to a good-sized audience, most of whom seemed to enjoy it thoroughly, and were as lavish in their commendation of the merits of the play as they were苛刻 of the talent of the actors. Others however confined their appreciation to the acting, and freely gave vent to their disapproval of the play. Of these two views we are inclined to coincide with the latter. The comedy cannot claim any considerable excellence in a literary way. The dialogue is often racy and witty, the situations very comical, and the spectacular effects fine, but the plot is loose and shakily, and frequently descends to the trivial and improbable. For Mr. Raymond's impersonation of "Fresh," we have nothing but the warmest admiration. He was the practical American stock broker to perfection, and his laughable and witty natural interpretation of the character, kept the house in a continual roar. Mr. Devere as "Achmet Pacha" made a most favorable impression. He was the dignified, authoritative Egyptian throughout. His presence was fine, his every movement graceful, and his acting finished in every particular. Most of the gentlemen made the best of their parts. The ladies played fairly also. "Fresh" will make an excellent piece for a matinee. To-night, Raymond appears in his greatest impersonation—"Col. Sellers." Go and see him.

Returned Missionary.—Elder Henry G. Boyle, of Payson, arrived home last night from a mission to the Southern States, upon which he started a year ago on the 1st of last March. He labored in Virginia and North Carolina, principally in the former State, where he traversed the counties of Tazewell, Smythe, Rialand, Bedford and Franklin. In North Carolina he labored in Surry and Stokes Counties. It was his seventh mission to the Southern States. During his recent absence about twenty souls were added to the Church, through the instrumentality of himself and brethren, and just previous to leaving Virginia, he organized a branch of the Church in Tazewell County, near Jeffersonville. It was called the Clinch Valley Branch. He says of his late experience that he never was treated better in his life. His meetings were well attended, strict order prevailed and a great many were investigating and many believing the Gospel, but a tardiness was manifested in conforming to its requirements.

Brother Boyle was accompanied home by a party of seven converts, two mothers with their children, the families of brethren who came to Utah several months ago, and procuring employment were advanced their wages in a sufficient sum to emigrate their households. The women, with their children at Ogden, took the Utah and Northern train for Smithfield, Cache County, to join their husbands. From Chattanooga to St. Louis, Elder Boyle traveled in company with President Morgan, who was on emigration business in the latter city. Brother Boyle enjoyed good health, while away, and returns feeling well in every respect. He leaves for Payson in the morning.

Powder Explosion.—We are informed by the *Union* of the 18th inst., of a fearful accident which occurred on Friday last, at about 3 p. m., on the new road to Milford, by which four of a party of soldiers, who are working there, were seriously injured. It seems that two men were blasting rock, and having charged a hole with giant powder, were tamping it with a sledge hammer, when it exploded, shattering not only the rock, but the men who were tamping it. The other two soldiers were standing about four feet off, and were thrown by the explosion a distance of eight or ten feet and badly but not fatally hurt. The Post Surgeon went to the scene of the mishap, and took the injured men to Fort Comstock.
