

A Woman Printed It.

Reference has been made to the Declaration of Independence; printers may not know the fact, but even that important document was originally printed by a lady, Mary Catherine Goddard. There were women in those days. To print that immortal State paper in the year of 1777 was to run the risk of losing one's head.

Miss Goddard was a sister of Wm. Goddard, the first printer in Providence, R. I. He also published the *Maryland Journal* in Baltimore in the early part of the revolution. When Benjamin Franklin became Postmaster-General, after Congress had superseded the British government, he appointed Goddard Comptroller and Surveyor of Post roads. While he was thus engaged in public matters, his sister conducted the affairs of the printing house with marked ability, being able to personally perform any of the duties of a thorough printer, while remaining clear-sighted, orderly and energetic in her management of the business.—*Rowell's Newspaper Reporter.*

Of general debility at Nephi, Juab Co., U. T., November 9, SALLY, relic of Elder James Randall.

Sister Randall was the daughter of George and Betsy Carlisle; was born in the town of Westmoreland, County of Cheshire, State of New Hampshire, May 28, 1805; was baptized a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints by Elder John P. Green, in the town of Warsaw, Genesee County, New York, in June, 1832. Sister Randall, together with her husband and children, resided in Kirtland, Missouri, Illinois and Iowa, enduring, in connection with the Saints, all the privations and persecutions in their travels from Kirtland to these valleys in the mountains, having emigrated to Utah in the Fall of 1852, locating at Nephi, where she continued to reside until her death. Since her husband's death, which took place thirteen years ago, she has resided with her son, Elder Eld Randall. Sister Randall was one of our oldest and most respected citizens; for many months she was a great sufferer, and longed for the time to come when she would be permitted to join her beloved and much respected husband and son. She was noted for her faith and integrity in the truth of the gospel as revealed by Joseph Smith. She left a son, daughter-in-law, four grandchildren and many friends.—*Com.*
