

SAYS HIS SPOUSE LIKED QUARRELING

Always Finding Fault, Using Vile
Language and Making His
Health Decline.

HAD A MOROSE DISPOSITION.

With Such a Condition Predicating
Their Marriage, He Seeks Re-
lief in Divorce.

William Cullin Sercomb filed suit in the Third district court yesterday against Mrs. Sadie Sercomb on the ground of cruelty. He declares that she used vile language toward him and that she was always finding fault and ready for a quarrel. She was of a morose disposition. The indignities heaped upon him were so numerous, he says, that his health was affected. They were married at Boone, Ia., and his wife is still living there. They have a child 21 months old which is with the mother.

Mrs. Mary Elva Jensen seeks a divorce from William E. Jensen on the charges of cruelty and non-support. They were married here on June 5, 1906. She declares that on several occasions Jensen had left home and remained away days without telling her where he was. She charges him with taking other women to places of amusement and failing to provide for her.

Conrad Whiting sued his wife, Aurora Whiting, yesterday for divorce in the Third district court on the charge of desertion. They were married at Salt Lake on April 6, 1906, and she left him one year later. There are no children.

MRS. ELLISON WANTS ALIMONY.
Mrs. Louise C. Ellison seeks a divorce from Clyde H. Ellison on the ground of non-support in a complaint filed today in the Third district court. They were married on July 7, 1904, and have two children, Matt, 3 years old, and a daughter, 2 years old. Since February, 1908, it is alleged in the complaint that Ellison has failed to support his family in any way. She asks for suitable alimony for her support.

DEMURRER OVERULED.
Daly West Mining Company Given
Five Days to Answer.

Judge Armstrong overruled the demurrer this morning in the case of H. Otto Hank and others against John J. Daly, president; Josiah Barnett, secretary, as officers of the Daly West Mining company. The defendants were given five days to file their answer. The suit was brought about a month ago by Hank and his associates to compel the officers of the Daly West Mining to allow them to examine the books of the company in regard to the legality of the last election. This the officers of the mining company refused to do and filed a general demurrer in the case, in which it was set forth that the district court was without jurisdiction. The plaintiffs ask for a writ of mandamus.

DISTRICT COURT NOTES.
By stipulation judgment was entered yesterday for \$200 against the Utah Mines corporation in favor of Theodore Kyriakos Zoutis and his mother, T. K. Zoutis, the father and mother of Theodore Zoutis, who was killed while working in the mines. The suit was for \$500.

In three cases against the Continental Mines and Smelting company, judgment was entered by default this morning in Judge Armstrong's court. Josiah Growthers was given judgment for \$1,000 for services rendered. The agency company was granted \$468 principal and \$732 interest for insurance furnished. Thomas H. Dale obtained judgment for \$10,000 principal, \$1,365 interest, and \$1,000 attorney fees. This action was brought on a promissory note.

Judge Morse granted judgment for \$300 principal and \$82.50 interest this morning in favor of the Manti Savings bank against Mrs. Elizabeth Livingston. The action was brought on a promissory note.

HOW VESUVIUS ERUPTION WORKS

Glimpse "Behind the Scenes" at
Fireworks Production at
Wandamere.

WHEN BIG VOLCANO GETS BUSY

Explosions of Dynamic Cause Fall of
Beautiful City at Foot of Moun-
tain—Making Fire Faces.

Persons who watch the big Pain
spectacle at Wandamere, "The Eruption
of Vesuvius," from the "front"
as performers term everything across
the footlights, have no idea of the
labor that is necessary behind the
scenes, in order to keep the long pro-
gram moving promptly according to
schedule. Another task, difficult in
itself, is that of drilling 250 persons,
men, women and children, so that
they show no evidences of awkward-
ness when they appear for the spec-
tacular interludes of the performance.
The problem of firing several hun-
dred pounds of explosives nightly,
without injury to anyone, and at the
precise moments the reverberations or
the illuminations are needed, is a
thing of large proportions. J.
Cunliffe, head pyrotechnist in the man-
on whose shoulders rests all of the
responsibility of the spectacle, has
been at the same post for twenty-six
years, and he has learned the art of
carrying out the duties of an evening with-
out any signs of perturbation.
The block-long frontage of scenery
replicating the city and Bay of Naples,
with smoking Vesuvius at the rear,
and a church, a reviewing stand, and
fruit and flower booths in the fore-
ground, is painted on heavy duck can-
vases. The scene is in sections, thirty
feet high, and about forty feet in
width, and all of them hang from a
light scaffolding. After the long pro-
gram of circus events, brought to a
climax by the fine work of the high
wire artists and while the Japanese
lantern parade is progressing, a half
dozen men scene and pyrotechnics
become active. They slip into tight
khaki jackets, and pull hats well
down over their heads.

VESUVIUS GETS BUSY.
A moment later, a series of terrific
detonations begins. Dynamite is ex-
ploded for the eruption of the moun-
tain. The explosive is hung, in three-
inch lengths, on a long wire, well
behind the stage, and the short sticks
are exploded by electricity. Old Ves-
uvius has been smoking gently all
evening, with the smoke furnished by
a small sheetiron stove, wherein
burns a "smudge," but now quanti-
ties of red fire and pyrotechnics are
ignited at the crest, again by means
of electricity, and an automatic con-
trivance "rips" a section of the top
of the mountain, disclosing the cup-
shaped crater.
While all of this has been proceeding,
the other operators, headed by Cunliffe,
have not been idle. The scaffolding
from which hangs the scenery has a
long shelf of lumber at the top, on
which rest liberal supplies of red fire
and explosives. Long fuses extend to
them and Cunliffe and his assistants
dash about firing them. Similar charges,
some containing more than a pound of
powder, have been placed behind the
"set pieces," as the flower booths, fruit
stands and other smaller pieces of scen-
ery are known, and these soon blaze up.
Then, as the roar of the "lava" con-
tinues, workmen loosen the ropes hold-
ing the scenes in place, and the sections
of canvas fall. The backs of the cur-

tains are painted in dark colors and
as the sections fall in jumbled masses
they closely resemble the wreckage of
ruined buildings. Behind the fallen
curtains, on iron poles, blaze great
masses of straw, furnishing the last
note of destruction in the realistic
representation of the scene.

MUST USE PRECAUTION.
In the case of the fireworks used at
Wandamere, their display simply is a
matter of using ordinary precautions,
and touching a torch to the fuses. Such
creations as the jumping jack and the
automatic elephant are made of iron,
to which is attached the pyrotechnics
that outline the figures in vari-colored
flames. Portraits are made by using
long ropes of fireworks resembling
ordinary fuses, and outlining the faces
on a heavy lumber background. It is
all easy when you know how.
