Secy. of War Taft Makes Full Reply to the Complaints of Dr. C. A. L. Reed.

MATTERS WILL BE REMEDIED.

President Scores Doctor'e Report and Says He Should Not Have Made it Public.

Washington, March 21 .- Secy, 'Faft today made public a letter which he has written to the president concerning complaints made by Dr. C. A. L. Reed regarding the work of the isthmian canal commission. In the course of his letter Secy. Taft said that many of the things complained of would be remedied by placing the control of the canal under one head or at least under a commission composed of not more than three members. He added that he will submit to the president in a short time, a plan for the rearrangement of the mission. President Roosevelt in his reply said he was glad to know that the secretary is preparing a plan for the regrangement of the commission and premises to give the plan immediate atention when received.

It is my queries he was so emphatic and so detailed in his charges that I asked him to make his statement in writing, which he did, upon the same day by the use of a stenographer. It is prob-able that had he taken more time he would have been more measured in his criticism, less extreme in his statents and less flippant in his references the action of the commission. Gorgas and his staff believed that it would be wiser to give them an entirely free hand in the matter of ordering construction supgive them an entirely free hand in the matter of ordering construction supplies and the employment of subordinates. It is quite probable that had the approval of the commission in the matter of ordering construction supplies been dispensed with, there would have been fewer delays and less complaint on this account, but in the expenditure of such large sums as were aditure of such large sums as were ecessary for the organization of the antary system the construction of plant and the purchases of supplies, it may well be doubted whether the com-mission would have been discharging its duty in withholding such supervisory

"It is doubtless, true that there have been undue delays in the furnishing of what was needed for sanitary purposes on the isthmus, but I venture to think that it is due rather to the inherent clumsiness of the commission as an executive body than to the non-attendance of any member of that body. There must be some restraint for purposes of economy upon expenditures by an executive who has in mind the total expenditures and obligations being incurred. To allow each department to expend what in its judgment is necessary will certainly lead to extravagance and waste. The remedy for the delays which may have occurred the delays which may have occurred the conferring of the executive on one, or at the most not more than three members of the commission, with a general supervisory and confirmatory bower in the commission as a body. "Dr. Reed has not displayed in this report the qualities of temperament or the power of accurate judicial observation needed to make a report valuable to the preriment. It is true that he was not charged with the duty of making such a report and that he was appointed to be a commissioner to assess the value of real estate. Nevertheless, when he assumed to make a report on assitary conditions at your request as secretary of war he was under obligation to speak with justice on so import-

secretary of war he was under obligation to speak with justice on so important a subject and to observe the proprieties as to its publication.

Judging from your report, it appears that the chief difficulties that
have arisen have come from the inherent faultiness of the law under which
the commission was appointed. It further appears, however that in view or
our experience with the workings of
the commission a rearrangement of duties and a change of personnel in view
of this rearrangement should be made.
I am glad that you are shortly to submit to me a plan with these objects in
view.

UNWORTHY OF BELIEF

Suc's is Conclusion of Committee Of Colorado Legislature Regarding a Colorado Senator.

REPORT ADOPTED, 72 TO 2.

Denver, Colo., March 21 .- The Colorado general assembly in joint convenmanager of the Colorado & Southern railroad, and Daniel M. Sullivan, postmaster of Cripple Creek, who had been charged with bribery in the gubernatorial contest.

On March 6, when the joint convention was hearing arguments in the Peabody-Adams contest, Senator Richard W. Morgan, a Republican, presented a signed declaration that Messrs. Herbert and Sullivan had offered him \$1,500 to vote for Alva Adams and that onehalf of this money, he said, he had placed in the hands of Dist. Atty. Geo, Stidger.

A committee was appointed to investigate this matter and all other reports of bribery affecting members of the legislature. This committee presented a report this afternoon to the effect that a report this afternoon to the effect that Senator Morgan was a confessed bribetaker and "unworthy of belief." The report was adopted by a vote of 73 to 2. Senator Morgan spoke in his own defense and declared he would push the prosecution of Messrs. Herbert and Sullivan in the criminal court.

The committee asked leave to make recommendations as to action in the

ommendations as to action in the case of Senator Morgan, to the senate, which was granted.

The committee met again this afternoon and issued subpoenas for managing editors of three local newspapers and the editor of a local weekly magazine to appear tomorrow morning and tell what information they had on which to base charges of corruption which were printed in their respective newspapers. newspapers

SUNKEN SHIPS.

English Co. Gets Contract to Raise Them at Port Arthur.

Victoria, B. C., March 21.—The steamship Hyades brought news from Japan that an English company has been awarded a contract to raise the sunken ships at Port Arthur. The former Russian cruiser Variag, sunk at Chemulpo, has been raised and brought to Nagasaki. She is being rapidly repaired, with a view to arming and com-missioning her under the Japanese flag.

Schwab Sails for Europe.

New York, March 21.—Charles Schwab salled for Europe today the steamer Kron Prinz Wilhelm. It was said today that Mr. Schwab was bound for St. Petersburg to negotiate the building of warships for Russia.

To Obstruct is Policy.

Vienna, March 21.—In regard to the emperor-king's inflexible attitude concerning the military demands of the Hungarian opposition party, the executive committee of the leading Kossuth party decided today to obstruct every cabinet, excluding the principle of the oppositional demand of Hungarian as the language of command, or any cabi-net formed without the consent of the opposition. This means practically a breach between the crown and parlia-ment. Rumors are current that the em-peror is considering the appointment

of a provisional cabinet, which will dissolve parliament and bring about iew general elections,

Mormons in Canada.

Ottawa, Ont., March 21.—The "Mor-mon" trouble in Canada is coming to a head. Some time ago reference was made to the large number of "Mormons" in the west, to the fact that some, in-cluding Apostle Taylor, were hiding there till the "Mormon" investigation in the United States was finished, and to the suspicion that several of the "Mormons" living there now were guilty of

polygamy.

Within the last few weeks or so the Northwest mounted police have received strict orders to prosecute all those who are polygamists even if they only aclu-

are polygamists even if they only aclually live with one wife, and order their out of the country.

The local newspapers in Alberta, the territory where the greatest number of "Mormona" live, are urging the government to hurry the prosecution because it looks as if the territories sare turned into provinces the "Mormons" will have at least two seats in the legislature and might use their legislative influence to prevent punishment of wrongdoers. wrongdoers.


