NEW YORK THEATERS.

Dist. Atty. Jerome Has Commenced Investigation of Them.

New York, March 21.—Dist. Atty. Jerome has commenced an investigation of all the city theaters, and an engineer is now examining them. "The board of fire underwriters," Mr. Jerome today said, "examined 30 theaters, and their report shows that 25 are not of fire-proof construction; eight, the building laws were not approved; 25, presentation laws not approved; 30, electric curtains not approved; 30, sky lights not approved; 35, automatic sprinklers and hose pipes not approved; 42, dressing rooms not approved; 30, carpenter rooms not approved; 30, electricians' rooms not approved; 35, property rooms not approved; 32, stand pipes not approved; 32, fire hooks, axes not approved; and six, electrical equipments not approved."

MUST LEAVE HAYTI.

Public Notice Given Syrians Living in Port au Prince.

Port au Prince, Hayti, March 21.—Public notice is made in the Official Monteur today that Syrian traders must settle their affairs, cease trading and leave the country by April 1. Their legations must designate the liquidators.

Col. Allen Smith Retired.

Washington, March 21.—Col. Allen Smith, Sixth cavalry, has been retired with the rank of brigadier general.

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RICHARD W. MORGAN UNWORTHY OF BELIEF

Such is Conclusion of Committee Of Colorado Legislature Regarding a Colorado Senator.

REPORT ADOPTED, 72 TO 2.

This is the Man Who Said He Had Been Offered \$1,500 to Vote for Alva Adams.

Denver, Colo., March 21.—The Colorado general assembly in joint convention this afternoon exonerated James M. Herbert, vice president and general manager of the Colorado & Southern railroad, and Daniel M. Sullivan, postmaster of Cripple Creek, who had been charged with bribery in the gubernatorial contest.

On March 6, when the joint convention was hearing arguments in the Peabody-Adams contest, Senator Richard W. Morgan, a Republican, presented a signed declaration that Messrs. Herbert and Sullivan had offered him \$1,500 to vote for Alva Adams and that one-half of this money, he said, he had placed in the hands of Dist. Atty. Geo. Stidger.

A committee was appointed to investigate this matter and all other reports of bribery affecting members of the legislature. This committee presented a report this afternoon to the effect that Senator Morgan was a confessed bribe-taker and "unworthy of belief."

The committee met again this afternoon and issued a subpoena for managing editor of the local newspapers and the editor of a local weekly magazine to appear tomorrow morning and tell what information they had on which to base charges of corruption which were printed in their respective newspapers.

COUNCIL OF WOMEN.

Fifth Triennial Session Called to Meet in Washington April 9.

Washington, D. C., March 21.—The fifth triennial session of the National Council of Women of the United States will convene in Washington, D. C., April 9 to 15.

The 9th will be devoted to religious services. The 10th will be an executive session; the 11th, 12th, 13th and 14th will be given to the triennial program. The 15th will be the closing executive session. The council headquarters will be at the Shoreham hotel. The sessions will be divided into morning meetings, which will be strictly executive in character, and afternoon sessions, at which all members of affiliated bodies are welcome, at which reports from societies and committees will be read, and the closing sessions, to which the general public is invited, and which will be addressed by eminent speakers of prominence and ability.

The president of each affiliated organization and local council is asked to send the name and address of her proxy, if one is to represent her organization, to the president and corresponding secretary of the national council.

Members of the council eligible to sit in executive session are: First, general officers of the national council; second, the heads of cabinet departments and the chairmen of both standing and special committees; third, presidents and delegates of national organizations; fourth, presidents of local councils.

TO OBTAIN IT POLLEY.

Vienna, March 21.—In regard to the emperor's inflexible attitude concerning the military demands of the Hungarian opposition party, the executive committee of the leading Kosovitz party decided today to obstruct every cabinet, excluding the principle of the oppositional demand of Hungarian as the language of command, or any cabinet formed without the consent of the emperor. This means practically a breach between the crown and parliament. Rumors are current that the emperor is considering the appointment

of a provisional cabinet, which will dissolve parliament and bring about new general elections.

Mormons in Canada.

Ottawa, Ont., March 21.—The "Mormon" trouble in Canada is coming to a head. Some time ago reference was made to the large number of "Mormons" in the west, to the fact that some, including Apostle Taylor, were hiding there till the "Mormon" investigation in the United States was finished, and to the suspicion that several of the "Mormons" living there now were guilty of polygamy.

Within the last few weeks or so the Northwest mounted police have received strict orders to prosecute all those who are polygamists even if they only actually live with one wife, and order them out of the country.

The local newspapers in Alberta, the territory where the greatest number of "Mormons" live, are urging the government to hurry the prosecution because it looks as if the territories were turned into provinces the "Mormons" will have at least two seats in the legislature and might use their legislative influence to prevent punishment of wrongdoers.

Coal for Russian Fleet.

London, March 21.—The correspondent at Aden of the Daily Mail reports that 34 steamers laden with 100,000 tons of coal are waiting at Jibuti for the Russian fleet, which is expected there at the end of the month.

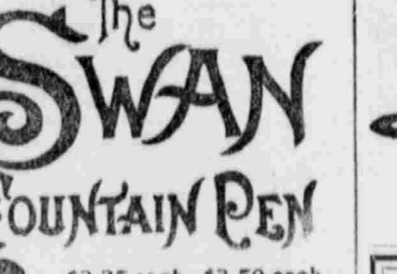
