> —On Sunday, July 12th, a murder was committed in Paradox Valley, 100 miles west of Montrose, Col., near the Utah line, the facts of which were brought to light on Sunday upon the arrest of a boyish-looking young man of about 22 years, named M.V. Rollins. The murdered man was John W. Prentiss, who had been engaged in ranching and teaching school in the valley Rollins had been living with him, and the two had arranged a prospecting trip to Leadville and Aspen, the ar-rangements being made for the outfitting and expenses by Prentiss. Rolliss had acted strangely during Sunday and the two days fol-lowing, and while the "neighbors had suspicions that there was some thing wrong from the fact that Prentiss was not about as usual, they supposed Rollins was telling the truth when he said that Prentiss had gone alone to Telluride, and they were not fully set-tled in their suspicions until they found on Wednesday that Rollins had gone, leaving a placard on the house which read "Keep Out!" They went in and finding tue traces of crime soon found the body of Prentiss in a well near the house. They at once believed that Rollins had murdered him and then ran away. Senator J. P. Galloway arrived in Mon'rose Saturday, finding that Rollins had arrived the day before Being placed under arrest, Rollins was found to have in his pockets Prentiss' watch and some valuable papers and some \$80. He rode from Paradox on one of the two horses belonging to Prentiss, and led the other. Putting the horses in a livery stable he proceeded to do the town, playing faro at the saloons and buying wine in the houses of ill-fame, till he had spent more than \$400. His actions were more those of a runaway schoolboy than a man of sense, and he acted as though very much unconcered when unier arrest.
