MUST CONNECT WITH SEWERS

Authorities Are Pressing Matter Of Enactment of Ordinance,

INSPECTION OF LAUNDRIES.

Health Department is Leaving No Stone Unturned to Make Salt Lake a Model City.

The matter of sewer extensions and connections is now receiving considerable attention from the health authorities, and action is now under way for the enactment of an ordinance by the council which will compel property owners to make use of the sewers by connecting with the same. An ordinance to that effect is now being prepared by Councilman Robertson, chairman of the sewer committee, City Physician King and City Attorney Nye.

Under the present ordinance it is impossible to make people connect with the sewers, even if the laterals run to The result is that their very doors. there are less than 1,400 sewer connec tions in this city, which, according to the figures of City Engineer Kelsey to be in proportion to other cities of the same size, should be four times that number. number. It is the general belief among progressive citizens that sewer connections should be made and there-by do away with the cesspools which are such a menace to the health of the city.

NEED MORE SCAVENGERS.

It is a recognized fact that there are not sufficient licensed scavengers in the spring cleaning up which is now under way in the city. People are engaged in raking up the accumulations of the past winter and piling the same up for removal, but it is impossible to secure scavengers to remove the same within a reasonable time. Hence the health authorities are receiving many com-plaints on that account, and are making efforts to secure a larger force of scavengers.

INSPECT LAUNDRIES.

The laundries of the city will receive special attention from the inspectors who will see that they are kept in a sanitary condition. It is contended by the health authorities that clother being gathered from so many different homes and all thrown together may be the cause of spreading disease, as many of them are from houses where there are contagious diseases.

CLEAN FOOD. The restaurants are to have careful attention at the hands of the inspect-There is a tendency among the cheaper houses to be a little negligen in regard to cleanliness in cooking and serving food to the public. In some instances the food is prepared near places so flithy that it is impossible for it not to become contaminated by meat has been used in various cho houses to make up the dish commonly known as "hash," and the health au-

thorities intend to condemn all meat that is stale.
