E. L. White Says Future of Property Has Been Under Discussion.

MAY RESUME WORK SOON.

Says Heinze Is Rapidly Rounding Out The Ohio Copper En-

terprise.

That the interests identified with the Western Utah Copper company's properties at Gold Hill, in the Deep Creek country, are working on plans which may result in the resumption of work in the near future, has been virtually admitted by E. L. White, former

work in the near future, has been virtually admitted by E. L. White, former president of the Bingham Consolidated and one of the big men in the Western Utah. If the metal market improves, he declared today, there is not the slightest doubt about it; but nothing has been definitely outlined.

"There is not very much encouragement under existing conditions," said Mr. White, "to start up anything. However, I am firmly of the belief that we have seen the worst, and that there will be a steady improvement in general business conditions, which naturally will reflect towards a betterment in the copper market. I do not believe that we are going to witness any setback because of the presidential cumpaign; no matter which of the two great political parties is successful at the polls next November, this great country of ours is going to continue to grow and become greater and greater, just as It has done in the past. Our immediate prosperity depends largely upon the crops and there is every indication now that the harvest will be a bounteous one. Taking for granted that that will be the case, money will be plentiful and we will enjoy an era of good times; men of wealth will seek investments in industrial and mining enterprises. The eastern banks have plenty of money to loan; but the security must be gilt edged; that is to say, the practise of making loans on stocks has been largely done away with.
