NEW YORK.

Various.

New York, 18.—The Atlantic fire in-
surance company of Brooklyn, has sus-
pended business in consequence of the
Chicago losses. Its liabilities aggregate
\$500,000; assets \$215,000. The directors
express confidence in their ability to
resume in a few weeks.

Charles O'Connor accepts the appoint-
ment of associate counsel to the State
attorney general in the prosecution of
persons concerned in the city and coun-
ty frauds.

The chamber of commerce relief com-
mittee has appropriated \$1,500 for the
relief of Chicago.

Two thousand pounds sterling, con-
tributed in Sheffield, was paid over to
the committee to-day.

MICHIGAN.

Founded.

DETROIT, 18.—The fine passenger
steamer, R. G. Coburn, founded in
Saginaw bay last Sunday. Seven of
the crew and three of the passengers
are known to have been saved. Two
others with the officers and the balance
of the crew are missing.

MASSACHUSETTS.

WORCESTER, 18.—The report that the
First National insurance company of
this city has suspended is incorrect.

Contributions to the Suffering—The
Steamer "Horton."

BOSTON, 18.—The subscriptions here
for the relief of Chicago reach \$125,-
000.

The schooner Horton arrived at
Gloucester this evening. A grand re-
ception was given the crew by the citi-
zens.

The receipts of the Nilsson concert
were \$8,300.

PENNSYLVANIA.

PHILADELPHIA, 18.—The enterprise
insurance company of this city has not
suspended as was reported.

For President in 1872.

PITTSBURG, 18.—The Post to-morrow
comes out in favor of Thos. A. Scott for
President in 1872.

ERIE, 18.—This city raised \$25,000 for
the relief of the Chicago, Michigan and
Wisconsin sufferers, and the county
commissioners are expected to vote
\$5,000 additional.

The U. S. steamer Michigan leaves
here to-night for Detroit, to offer her
services in carrying supplies to the
burnt districts of Michigan.

MAINE.

A Demonstration.

BANGOR, 18.—An immense crowd was
here to-day to see the President and
witness the demonstration upon the
completion of the European and North
American railway, which consisted of
a grand procession and a banquet with
speeches by distinguished citizens of
Canada and the United States.

FOREIGN NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN.

LONDON, 18.—Three thousand pounds
were subscribed in Belfast Ireland, to-
day, for the relief of Chicago.

PRUSSIA.

BERLIN, 18.—Frederick William and
Victoria, recognizing the cordial sym-
pathy shown by America for the Ger-
man soldiers during the late war, con-
tributed five hundred thalers for the
relief of Chicago.

FRANCE.

Disparaging with Chicago.

PARIS, 18.—M. Laboulaye, appointed
chairman of the Chicago relief com-
mittee, has issued an address asking
contributions. He says France, poor as
she is, desires to show her gratitude
and make some practical return for
the sympathy shown her in her misfortune
by the people of America.

Final Ratification of Treaty.

The final ratification of France of
the treaty with Germany, has been dis-
patched to Berlin. By the terms of
the treaty the six departments
to be evacuated by the Germans are
declared neutral territory, in a military
point of view, until the stipulated pay-
ments of indemnity are completed.
During that time these departments
will not be occupied by French troops,
and should France not fulfill her finan-
cial obligations, they will be re-occu-
pied by the Germans.

MEXICO.

Chronic Revolution.

CITY OF MEXICO, 18.—The pronun-
ciamento attempted here on the 15th
of September was promptly suppressed.
Diaz is reported to be on the road be-
tween Puebla and Vera Cruz with a
thousand men. The national forces of
Orizaba will march against him.

Mr. Morris Phillips writes to the
Home Journal from Paris: "Those who
go to Paris to see the Exposition will
five cheaply will be sadly mistaken.
Before the war this may have been true;
but a great change has taken place.
War is a costly game, and the loser
must pay the price. To help pay the
Prussian demand everything has been
taxed: provisions with other com-
modities; per consequens hotel charges
are high. True, a good dinner, table
d'hôte, is served with wine for five
francs, and the rate per night for lodg-
ing is reasonable, but attendance is
charged separately, and so are candles;
and when the traveler gets his bill he
is amazed with items and extras he
never dreamed of."

Mr. James Brooks writes from abroad:
"The English language, I see, and the
more I see the better I see it is becom-
ing the universal language of the edu-
cated world. Twenty or twenty-five
years ago, only French would
carry you through the world; but now
it is impossible to go anywhere, from
the pyramids of Egypt to the moun-
tains of Japan, that English will not
profitably carry you along. Chinese
house servants, more or less, speak
English—'pigeon English,' as it is
called—but, nevertheless, comprehensi-
ble, English; and go where you will, in
whatever society, English seems now
to be the language."
