LEHI. JOHN S. McAFEE DEAD. Veteran and Pioneer Lays Down Life's Cares at 84.

Special Correspondence. Lehi, Utah Co., Feb. 21.—John S. McAfee, a much respected old citizen of Utah, and one of the pioneers of Provo valley, died at 4 o'clock this morning. He was born in the county of Antrim, Ireland, March 23, 1819.

When a young man he moved to Scotland, where he joined the "Mormon" Church, and in 1842 he came to Utah, locating at Lehi. A year later he moved to Provo valley, and was one of the pioneers who built up Lehi City. Later he moved to Charleston and became one of the leading farmers of the valley. A year ago he sold out his interest there and returned to Lehi to end his days.
