There was grief which brought from what appeared a dried up source copious tears, which drenched the bronzed face of the dead, and proved to us that "one touch of nature makes all the world akin." The old mother was gently taken from the dead, and the coffin lowered in the grave. An-other parting look she must have, Clutching her long staff, and clad in a well-worn rabbit skin mantle, shi groped to the edge of the grave, gazed down and gave a gutteral sound that seemed like a sigh; was led back. lifted into the old wagon and covered in her grief with a blanket,

Elder George Crane dedicated the grave.
