Gov. Cutler said in part: 'I am greatly pleased to welcome the visiting officers of this organization to the State of Utah and to the city of Sait Lake. It is always presumed that organizations among men and women should have as their purpose the betterment of humanity. It is the only basis on which they can long endure, the only basis on which they can make successful appeal to the people. Utah extends a hearty welcome to all helpful, beneficent associations. If they are all pure in purpose and beneficial in operation, these organizations will do good. While I know but little of the alms and purposes of the society represented here today, I assume that it must come under the above heading, or it would here today, I assume that it must come under the above heading, or it would not appeal to so many intelligent women, and hold their allegiance. Among the views regarding the connection of women with these societies, I incline to that particular one which holds that the first allegiance of women should be the first allegiance of women should be the first allegiance of women should be given to their home life, but to mingle enough with public organizations to relieve the tension of the constant worries and responsibilities of the home, and the care of husband and children. A woman's first duty is her home. But I believe her work in the home can be done more intelligently and effectively if she occasionally mingles with her fellow-women in a public capacity, and gains courage and strength which come from a change of scene and atmosphere. And these organizations may thus become a means to belp women in thus become a means to belp women in their home work, and also a means of ameliorating the condition of men, wonen and children in the community at

men and children in the community at large.

"The visiting ladies may be interested in learning that the people of Utah are ploneers in the matter of ladies' benevolent associations. The first settlers brought with them in 1847 an organization formed a few years before, known as the Female Relief society, whose purpose was the alleviation of want and sickness. The institution is still flourishing, and is a power for almost unlimited good. It is now somewhat national in character, Other associations of like kind have since been formed, and these, with the women's clubs and other social organizations, give to Utah a considerable tions, give to Utah a considerable prestige in this line of endeavor. Our state, I am proud to say, has always been among the first to recognize the virtues and regard the rights of wo-

men.
"It is to this atmosphere of chivalry and high respect that I welcome these distinguished visitors."



MAY APPOINT TEN.

National Civic Federation Asks Gov. Cutler to Name Delegates.

An invitation was received by Gov. Cutler today from the secretary of the Cutler today from the secretary of the National Civic Federation, in which he is requested to appoint 10 delegates and 10 alternates to represent Utah at the next session of the federation to be held in Chicago from May 28 to 31, inclusive. The principal subject for consideration is "trusts and combinations." Other matters of importance to be discussed are the following:

1—Government power over corporations engaged in interstate commerce; the division of power under the Constitution between the nation and the state; power concurrent in nation and state.

2—How should the corporation be constructed; should there he national corporations as well as state; the basis of capitalization of corporations; their internal control; provisions looking to the protection of investors and stockholders as well as fair dealing with the public; distinction between public service and other corporations.

3—The just and practicable limits of the restriction, federal and state, of combinations in transportation, production, distribution and labor.
