ONE WOMAN WHISTERING IN HER GORE AND ANOTHER WOUNDED.

Between the hours of 10 and 11 o'clock last night, a woman named Nellie T. Wilder was found dead with a bullet in her brain, at her residence, just south of the old Idaho store, on First East Street, and another named Jessie Walton, was wounded in the arm.
