## LOCAL BRIEFS.

BOUNTY FRAUDS SUIT.

State Bank Seeks to Recover From Jones and Rumsby.

The State Bank of Utah has filed suit in the superior court at San Francisco against Charles Jones, alias Ward, and James Rumsby, alias George, to recover \$3,500 paid by the bank for fraudulent bounty certificates sold by defendants who are now in the county jail in this city charged with defrauding the state out of about \$30,000 by their bounty fraud operations of last fall. Sheriff Emery, while locating Rumsby and while working on the case in San Francisco, found that the man owned a house and lot in that city. It is believed that Jones also owns property there, hence the bank is attempting to secure judgment against the men and then seize the property to satisfy the judgment. Jones is now serving a term of one year in the county jail for his part in the frauds, he having pleaded guilty to criminal conspiracy. Rumsby is in jail awaiting trial.

COUNTY SCHOOL BONDS.

Contracts Made to Dispose of \$85,000 of Them at Good Prices.

Contracts have been entered into for the sale of Salt Lake county school bonds issued by several school districts recently in the total sum of \$85,000. E. H. Rollins & Sons of Denver and Chicago, purchased the bulk of the bonds, their purchases amounting to \$62,500. The remaining \$22,500 worth of bonds were sold to Ray Van Cott and W. W. Wilson for local parties at par. The bonds of Sugar House district brought 100 and those of Murray and Pleasant Grove 100, while all the other bonds sold at 95. The bonds all bear 5 per cent interest and are payable in 20 years.

JUNE 15th

1750—Franklin drew electricity from the clouds. Franklin's study of the identity of lightning with electric fluid was due to long and patient study of the subject. He procured lightning rods first and to prove his theory sent a kite into the clouds. Other sparks from tall iron rods and elevated Leyden jars. His lightning rod was put to the test a year later.

1756—George Washington took command of the American army.

1849—James Knox Polk, eleventh president, died at Nashville.

1871—Commodore Josiah Tattnall, prominent Confederate naval officer, died at Savannah.

1904—Russia's Vladivostok fleet destroyed five Japanese vessels in the Gulf of Korea. The New York excursion steamer General Bloom burned in Long Island Sound; 312 persons on a church excursion outing lost their lives.
