COLLISION WAS TERRIFIC. Awful Disaster on the Missouri Pacific Near

# Independence, Mo.

Wreck Takes Fire-Partial List of the Killed and Injured-Cause of the Accident.

Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 27 .- The fast Pacific, due to arrive in Kansas City at 5:45 this evening, was delayed by a freight train which stuck in a snowdrift two miles south of Independence, Mo. The St. Louis local passenger train, running forty minutes behind the fast express, came on through a blinding snowstorm and crashed into the express train ahead, the engineer having failed, in the driving snow, the danger signal, which the first train had sent back. The parlor car in the rear of the first train was literally cut in two, and when Engineer Frank Raymond and his fireman escaped from the wreck they crawled out through the windows of the parlor car. Fire added to the horrors of the wreck, coals from the furnace of the shattered engine having fallen among the debris of the splintered car, and soon the whole wreck was ablaze. Two or more persons, it is believed, were burned. A list of the dead and seriously injured, so far as known, is as follows: The killed are: Mrs. J. G. All of the injured have been brought to University hospital in Kansas City. William Rost, a farmer near whose place the wreck occurred, and who was one of the first to render any assistance to the imperilled passengers, is quite sure that at least three women burned in the wreck. When he reached the car, flames were crackling through the splintered woodwork of the car at one end, while at the other a cloud of blistering steam was issuing from the locomotive, which had ripped the coach open from end to end. On every side were men and women crying or assistance Mr. Rost's first act was to pull from

the wreck a woman whose legs were sticking out through a broken window. She was not badly hurt. By the time this had been accomplished other pas-sengers from the forward coaches had had come back and helped out all of those in the burning car who could be

reached. Mr. Rost states he saw the body of one woman jammed in the roof of the burning coach, and that it was not reached by the rescuers.

The body of another woman was con-sumed in full view of the passengers who gathered about the wreck. Mr. Rost and others tried to drag her out, but she was pinioned under heavy wreckage. Mr. Rost says the young woman was apparently dead, as he reached her hand and there was no re-sponse to his efforts at rescue.

"It will be a great point gained if we could get the man in the street to realize what the handing over of the rand to Rhodes and his clique would first to reproduce in Johannesburg the conditions that prevail in Kimberley. "The amalgamation of the diamond mines under the DeBeers company re-

sulled in a decrease of the white popu lation. The natives were shut up in compounds which they might not leave night or day. Within the compounds the truck system was established and money accordingly was withdrawn from circulation. It soon came about that no

## one was left in Kimberley but those who recognized the dominance of the company socially, politically and commercially. "The Boer government resolutely sets its face against the compound system. There were about \$0,000 natives employed in the mines at three guineas a month spiece. If that sum were with-

drawn from circulation as in Kimber-ley it would be put info the pockets of mine owners. Monopoly would be an accomplished fact. CRUSHING MONOPOLY. "At present it is possible for inde-

pendent tradesmen and storekeepers to make a living in Johannesburg. With the compound system once introduced, the town would belong to the financiers. The only solution which will con-serve English interest permanently in South Africa is to leave the republics independent so far as their internal af-fairs are concerned. Short of this I am convinced that England eventually will lose Africa, for if it destroys the republics now and attempts to hold them down while the capitalist ring jumps on them, she will rouse such a feeling of indignation throughout Africa as will place all the Dutch and many others, who are purely British, in permanent hostility, which means that England will

be unable to govern the country.
