DEMARA SHOWING SPEED.

Walter Demara, the speedy amateur from California, is showing great speed on the Salt Lake and Ogden tracks. He leads the amateurs in point of winnings, and seems determined to smash a few records. At Ogden last night he gave an exhibition of speed and smashed the three-quarter-mile handicap world's record by clipping the mark down to 1:24.4-5.

The record was established a year ago last June by Hume Demara, pulled the mark down to 1:24.4-5.

SURPRISE OF THE SEASON.

Salt Lake Nine Then Gives Preston Team Severe Drubbing—Game Full of Errors.

Local baseball fans have certainly had a busy time of it during the past three days.

Saturday afternoon on Walkers field the surprise of the season took place when the Occidentals, colored ball tossers, gave the Dube aggregation a severe drubbing and the first shut out for that team this season.

There was a large crowd of enthusiastic spectators, the majority of them being colored, and the row they made by their rooting was enough to awaken the dead.

The Dube team apparently expected easy picking, but it soon developed that the colored bunch was a pretty tough proposition. The credit belongs chiefly to one Gans, who did the slab work for the Occidentals. The way he handled out the in and out shots, drops, dips, spurs and angles had the local crowd puzzled. All they got was four little singles and not once did a man clear the bags. There was a great celebration in darkness after the game, while the team of white ball tossers was almost paralyzed over the result.
