AUTO SPEEDING.

CITY COUNCIL IN SESSION.

Water and Railway Franchises Considered-Wedding Bells-J. S. Noble Narrowly Escapes Injuries.

Orden, Utah, June 13,-The rapid speed at which some automobilists in Ogden have driven their automobiles throughout the county, and especially in Orden canyon endangering life and property, has been taken note of by the county commissioners who at their regular meeting yesterday passed the following ordinance:

Every person driving, operating or running any automobile, motor cycle, comobile, or any vehicle other than those drawn by horses or other animals. upon the public highway in Ogden canyon in Weber county, State of Utah, shall meet and pass like vehicles by scasonably turning to the right, and shall meet and pass vehicles drawn by porces or other animals by scasonably turning to the side of the said highway

toward and nearest to the river, and every person driving any vehicle drawn every person driving any vehicle drawn by horses or other animals upon said public highway shall meet and pass like vehicles by seasonably turning to the right, and shall meet and pass automobiles, motor cycles, locomobiles, or any vehicle other than those drawn by horses or other animals by season-ably turning to the side of the said herway furtherest and away from the

highway furtherest and away from the Ogden river.

Orden river. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of committing a public nuisance and guilty of a misdemeanor. Every person driving, operating or running any vehicle upon any public read, street, highway, public square, or school ground cutside of the limits of incorporated cities; in Weber county, State of Utah, who wilfully causes or permits any such vehicle to run at sufficient speed to endanger human life, or to be liable to cause the destruction of property, shall be deemed guilty of committing a public nuisance and guilt, of a misdemeanor, of a misdemeanor. Utah Pioneer and Nauvoo Veteran Goes To Rest at 75.

Special Correspondence, Taylorsville, Sait Lake Co., June 12.--Homer M. Brown of this place passed into the great beyond very early this morning, after almost two years of con-unuous illness. In August 1903, he was savagely attacked by a bull in his corral and has been more or less an invalid ever since. Deceased was born in Pomphroit Township. Chautauqua Co. New York, Aug. 9, 1830. He is a son of Bishop Beh-jamin Urown and Sarah Mumford Brown. His father was too first Bishop of the Fourth ward, Sait Laze City.

They are descendants of the early Quak-or settlers of New York, and were early identified with the history of the Church, settling in Nauvoc, June 6, 1839, where the deceased was baptized when nine years old.
