County Commissioners Pass Ordinance Governing Traffic on County Roads.

## CITY COUNCIL IN SESSION.

Water and Railway Franchises Considered—Wedding Bells—J. S. Noble Narrowly Escapes Injuries.

Ogden, Utah, June 12.—The rapid speed at which some automobiles in Ogden have driven their automobiles throughout the county, and especially in Ogden canyon endangering life and property, has been taken note of by the county commissioners who at their meeting yesterday passed the following ordinance:

Every person driving, operating or running any automobile, motor cycle, locomobile, or any vehicle other than those drawn by horses or other animals, upon the public highway in Ogden canyon in Weber county, State of Utah, shall meet and pass like vehicles by seasonally turning to the right, and shall meet and pass like vehicles by seasonally turning to the left, and shall meet and pass like vehicles by seasonally turning to the side of the said highway toward and nearest to the river, and every person driving or operating any vehicle other than those drawn by horses or other animals upon said public highway shall meet and pass like vehicles by seasonally turning to the right, and shall meet and pass like vehicles by seasonally turning to the left, and shall meet and pass like vehicles by seasonally turning to the side of the said highway toward and nearest to the river, and every person driving or operating any vehicle other than those drawn by horses or other animals upon said public highway shall meet and pass like vehicles by seasonally turning to the right, and shall meet and pass like vehicles by seasonally turning to the left, and shall meet and pass like vehicles by seasonally turning to the side of the said highway toward and nearest to the river.

Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of committing a public nuisance and guilty of a misdemeanor.

Every person driving, operating or running any vehicle upon any public road, street, highway, public square or school ground outside of the limits of incorporated cities, in Weber county, State of Utah, shall meet and pass like vehicles by seasonally turning to the right, and shall meet and pass like vehicles by seasonally turning to the left, and shall meet and pass like vehicles by seasonally turning to the side of the said highway toward and nearest to the river.

Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of committing a public nuisance and guilty of a misdemeanor.

The board appointed as water commissioners for the Ogden River, Frank H. Stratford for District No. 1, comprising Ogden river and its tributaries, and Chadwick, Jr., for district No. 2, comprising Weber river and its tributaries.

Commissioners Wilson and Madison appointed a committee from Weber county to the National Grange convention to be held at Portland from June 12 to 24. The gentlemen will also represent various road rollers and rock crushers on exhibition at the fair for the purpose of purchasing such machinery to be used in making good roads throughout Weber county.

BOARD OF EQUALIZATION DATES.

The county board of equalization met yesterday afternoon and considered a number of applications for reduction of taxes on account of indigency, or for reduction or alteration in assessed value of property in Weber county. It will meet again on the following dates: Wednesday, June 14, at 10 a. m.; Friday, June 16, at 10 a. m. and 2 p. m.; Saturday, June 17, at 10 a. m. and 2 p. m.

After June 24, no application under the law can be received or considered, and the taxpayers must govern themselves accordingly.

CITY COUNCIL SESSION.

The situation in regard to the water franchise before the city council assumed a new phase last night, because of a proposition submitted by S. H. Henderson and Rudolph C. Kuchler, who applied for a franchise to construct and operate waterworks in the city of Ogden. The proposition provides for a rate practically the same as that proposed for the present company, but the new company will be organized and acquire the water for the city, which is one of the oldest and best water rights in Ogden river. The further plans of the promoters cannot be learned, but if the materialize will be called together and all arrangements perfected for the transfer of the same.
