

# LECTURED ON EDDY DOCTRINE.

Dr. W. P. McKenzie of Boston  
Defines Position of Christian  
Scientists.

SAYS EVIL IS NOT A REALTY.

Scientists are Confirmed Optimists  
And Forget Things That Are  
Behind.

The Salt Lake Theater was well filled last evening, by an audience in attendance on a lecture on Christian Science by Dr. W. P. McKenzie of Boston, Mass. He was introduced by Hon. Frank B. Stephens, who said in part:

"Today more than ever before the world is asking the question: What is God? What are his attributes? Are they life, truth and love? Did God create only what is good, or did he also create evil and sickness? Is death the doorway to the more abundant life promised by our Savior, or is this more abundant life something we are entitled to have here now? These are questions which more and more occupy the minds of thinking people; and are these questions new; they are as old as history. Almost 30 centuries ago the greatest man among the children of Israel, their first king, Saul, chosen as the one above all others, possessing the physical, moral and intellectual qualities necessary to a great leader, was so grievously afflicted by some unknown ailment, that he was wholly unfit to perform his duty as king. All other means failing, his friends sent for David to play the harp before him, hoping thereby to rouse the king from his deep melancholy.

"Health spoke of one to come who should be as 'rivers of water in a dry place,' and as 'the shadow of a great rock in a weary land.'"

"In the fulness of time, the vision of the Christ was fulfilled, and the One came, who set at naught all the powers of evil. But the truth unfolded by a man of Galilee was crushed to the earth, sometimes to rise again, gradually, with the millennium, sometimes to be crushed again, as in the vision of St. Paul or a Savonarola; sometimes uttered by a poet as in Lowell's vision of St. Laurence; sometimes breathed through the sweet spirit of a Whittier who said: 'Where love dwells the peace of God is there.'"

"But at last again unfolded, full-blown, in the life writings and teachings of Mary Baker G. Eddy under the name of Christian Science. In order that the principles of Christian Science may be correctly understood by those desiring to investigate them, the Mother Church in Boston has instituted a board of lecturers, composed of men who have made such a study of the principles of Christian Science that they are able to present them intelligently, and who are also gifted with such power and ability as public speakers, that it is always a pleasure to listen to their addresses."

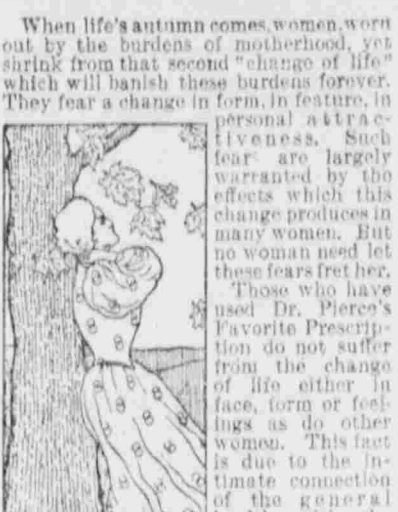
Dr. McKenzie said in part: "Christian Science has for its textbook or instruction manual, a book first published in 1852 by Mary Baker G. Eddy, entitled 'Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures.' The author is now known to the world as the woman who has given to this age the true idea of God, and as the philosopher who has revealed the sense of Christianity from theoretical to practical, so that the medieval belief of Christianity as a scheme for a future world salvation is changing to the true conception of Christianity as a means for revealing to men on earth the goodness of God in healing and salvation."

"The question presented to every man is really this: To what do you give power? Evil or good? Christian Scientists by virtue of their experiences are confirmed optimists. Where human love and human skill have given up hope. They have seen apparently incurable bad habits changed with such a change in life as yearly to change in the principle of the human mind, and they have seen the barren cold yields to the beneficent warmth of spirit. They have seen bitterness and cruelty and cynicism melt away, and kindness and joy and gentleness take their place. They find that their faithful application of the teachings of Christian Science to all the problems of life have brought so many solutions and proofs of the power of good over evil, that they can foresee the ultimate triumph of good, and forgetting the things that are behind, they press forward in the direction of that goal."

EVIL IS NOT A REALTY.

"Some teachers who are selfless and sincere, argue that moral evil and physical pain are not only realities but beneficent realities. Observing how a good deed shines in a naughty world, they seem to think the good deed owes its luster to surrounding wickedness. They infer that the patient on the bedridden saint in the street is the product of evil, and that the moral courage of the world's reformers is due to the wickedness they oppose. But it is the vision of God that inspires the saint to be meek and the reformer to be fearless, and that vision physical pain and moral evil have no part. Why then will men argue for the beneficent reality of evil? If evil works good then its agents are our benefactors, and why then should the most active doers of evil be restrained from their beneficent activity by our criticism? Physical pain is the teacher of fortitude, why permit teachers to heal pain?"

"Evil in belief constitutes a condition of perversion from normal from which conversion must be gained, before what is true and normal can be known at all, or man be as pure as the child of God. Jesus represents the Son of God. Jesus represents the revelation of true manhood or integrity, and in that condition of mind misrepresents both man and God. The process of overcoming evil with good is not merely a struggle with adverse environment, but a contest with wrong habits of thinking. The kingdom of heaven must first be established within. Godliness or goodness must displace ungodliness or godlessness. Here are confronted with a condition which seems to be a constant part of man's history, which theologians discuss under the name of sin. Some teachers claim this to be the greatest actuality of the present life, and some believe its disastrous effects to be eternal. The speaker affirmed that no single act on record warranted the belief that the woman of sin was one of the select circle of Christ's close friends; yet so strong a hold has the belief grown that Mary of Magdala was a notorious sinner, that the designation 'Magdalene' has come to be used as a synonym for a repentant sinner.

Mr. J. R. Righty sang, during the general exercises, two songs by Mrs. Holmes, 'The Pharisee and the Publican,' which were enjoyed by all present.

## WIND RIVER OUTRAGE.

Blowing Up of Drill Outfit Condemned  
By Chamber of Commerce.

Thermopolis, Wyo., Nov. 10.—The reported blowing up of the diamond drill outfit of Asmus Boyesen on the Wind River Indian reservation has been confirmed, and one outrage has followed another. The drill outfit was blown up 10 days ago, and last Saturday Boyesen received an anonymous letter warning him to leave the reservation with his outfit within 48 hours or it would be destroyed. Boyesen did not wait for the raiders to carry out their threat, but quickly moved just across the boundary, and is now in camp waiting some favorable word from Sheriff Hitchcock. He is, however, if Boyesen will again invade the reservation, for feeling here is strong against such a move, and it is doubtful if Boyesen could secure protection, even though Sheriff Hitchcock has ruled that he may prospect on the 150,000 acres of his original lease.

The authorities are doing everything possible to learn the identity of the raiders, but have failed. There were three men in the party. All were mounted, heavily armed and wore masks. Boyesen and his men were camped within 100 yards of the drill outfit at the time the explosion occurred. The prospectors were shaken up but not injured. The drill outfit was completely wrecked. The Thermopolis chamber of commerce passed resolutions condemning the outrage.

SECRET OF YOUTH.

Subject of Interesting Talk by Rev. Goshen at Y. M. C. A.

Rev. E. I. Goshen spoke to an attentive audience yesterday afternoon, in the Y. M. C. A. on the "Secret of Immortal Youth," in which he declared:

"I ask you to go from this hour with the firm determination written in your heart and brain that there is no such thing as a double-standard of morality for society, one for man and one for woman."

Then he said:

"One great reason why men grow old fast is because they throw away their life in dissipation. The street philosopher says you have an animal nature that cannot be controlled. This is a damnable lie. I think God has made man too good to know that social purity is possible and natural. God made man to rule his body with the power he gave him. Too long has society tampered with the animal nature of man. Rev. Mr. Goshen took his text from Isaiah XI, 31. 'But they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength. They shall mount up with wings as eagles. They shall walk and not faint.'"

"Every normal man desires to live just as long as he can enjoy life and be blessed with health, strength and usefulness. Every man has the power to keep young all his life if he could. A leading medical adviser who has made life a study lays down the following rules: Long life is not an accident; it is a result of habit. To keep young is to eat plain food, sleep regularly, exercise every day out of doors, and do not lose your temper."

"You have no power to carry a crank atmosphere down the street, to your office or place of business. And your home is the last of all places to spread this kind of a feeling. This is one of the secrets of youth: do not fret and worry. It will not do you any good unless you are in a hurry to die."

said the speaker. "There are three stages in every man's life. The first is the stage of growth, equilibrium and decay. It is said that young people think that old people are fools, and that old people know that young people are fools. I have seen every hand young people squandering their youth as if that precious inheritance were endless. You cannot take out of a bank more than you put in. The most foolish thing a youth can do is to waste his mental, moral and physical strength until the day comes when he is in an unproductive locality, and it is the experience of men."

"On the other hand, men have been known to 'carry the optimism and beauty of youth into old age. Holmes, Bryant, Franklin and Blumrich were marked examples of this. You say this was the case because they were physically men. They were physically well-laid, because they were morally clean. It is pitiful to see a man or a woman who has lost the enthusiasm of life. The Lord will plant the seed of immortality if you let him. Then the enthusiasm of life is renewed and the boy's heart is kept beating in the man's breast. It is easy enough to run when a great object is in view. The hard thing that undermines young men is to walk and not be weary—to work and achieve and not be weary. Waiting on the Lord gives man strength, life and power. There is no room for discouragement when waiting on God, trying to carry out His purposes."

## GOLD MEDAL FOR SECTION BOSSES.

Oregon Short Line Awarding Committee Started on Inspection Trip This Morning.

## 25 OFFICIALS ACT AS JUDGES.

General Supt. Buckingham and Aides Ride in Front of Engine in Specially Constructed Car.

Every section boss on the Oregon Short Line is now going over his section with a hand rake prior to the inspection of his section by General Supt. E. Buckingham and some 25 operating and maintenance officials who left Ogden this morning in a special train to be absent about 10 days. When they return every mile of the Short Line from Green River, Wyo., to Sparks, Nev., Salt Lake to Butte and Granger to Huntington, Or., will have been inspected.

From Idaho comes the report that the section bosses are out with sandpaper taking specks of rust off the rails on the sidings, while on the Montana division the switch bars are being gilded. From one end of the big system to the other everything this morning is in apple pie order.

The train consisting of the new inspection car and a pullman sleeper ahead of the engine and the dining car, Supt. Manson's car and General Supt. E. Buckingham's private car left Ogden this morning for Sparks, Nev., carrying in addition to the officials named, Chief Engineer Ashton, all the division engineers, division superintendents and a number of roadmasters to the total of some 25 including General Freight Agent J. A. Reeve and District Freight and Passenger Agent D. R. Gray who had been invited to go along and will leave the party at Reno and go on to Tonopah.

The occasion for this big gathering of officials is an inspection of the section bosses in view of awarding a gold medal to the section boss who has the best maintained section. Just now the scoring is going to be done in the morning. There is considerable rivalry over the outcome and a number of small bets are being placed on the winner of the gold medal.

Supt. Lewis has placed at the disposal of the train a dining car with Charlie Miller in charge. As Charlie has instructions not to sit on the lid it goes without saying that pleasure will be combined with business.

This is the first time that the Oregon Short Line has gone into the business of awarding gold medals, although the Southern Pacific has done so successfully for years.

In addition to the gold medal the happy section boss will also be accorded the distinction of erecting a sign board at each end of his section which will probably proclaim to all who ride past, "The Premier Section."

## RATE WAS CUT.

Union Pacific Beats Out Burlington on Football Excursion.

Hill and Harriman broke out in a fresh place on Friday over in Denver when the Burlington and the Union Pacific came to a head over the use of the Boulder football excursion to Lincoln, Neb. The Union Pacific accused the Burlington of giving some free transportation in order to get the football team to Lincoln. The Union Pacific said it would give the football team a rate of \$5 for the round trip which under ordinary conditions should have been \$34.10. As a result the U. P. carried 550 rooters out of Denver to Boulder to see the game at Lincoln, Neb.

## SAN PEDRO S. S. LINE.

Senator Clark Figuring on Four 15,000-Ton Steamers For Orient.

The story of a line of steamships from San Pedro to the Orient from San Pedro harbor which has been repeatedly denied by Vice President J. Ross Clark on the occasions of his visits here from time to time, is being repeated in a different guise. This time the Railway and Engineering Review is responsible, but it very thoughtfully omits the name of the firm that is to build the line. The Review says that the line is to be built in the harbor could not get up alongside of the ship at San Pedro.

Here is the story:

"Senator Clark, completed plans for the establishment of a line of steamships to be run from San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake railroad. These boats are to touch at the Hawaiian Islands and the ports of China, Japan and Manila, and are designed to compete with the steamers of the Hill lines, and to supplement the Harriman lines. The United States government has finished at San Pedro a breakwater costing \$100,000, which makes it a fine harbor, and vessels drawing 35 feet can enter. The San Pedro line has begun the construction of large docks at its terminal, and the company is chartering tramp steamers to connect the line with the coast and prepare for the establishment of the new line when the new boats already contracted for are finished. The contracts call for the building of four new 15,000-ton steamers."

## C. & S. TO EXTEND.

To Parallel to C. & N. W. to Douglas, Wyo., at Once.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Nov. 12.—A prominent business man here yesterday from Denver states that the Colorado & Southern will undoubtedly extend its Cheyenne & Northern branch from Orin Junction to Douglas city, and that the line has been completed and an estimate of the cost made. The maps and figures have been submitted to Gen. Grenville M. Dodge in New York, and it is expected he will approve the same.

The distance from Orin Junction to Douglas is 14 miles, and an easy grade has been secured paralleling the Chicago & Northwestern. The present terminus of the Cheyenne & Northern at Orin is in an unproductive locality, save for the Platte Valley and one or two other ranches, but with the terminus at Douglas, the Colorado & Southern would secure sufficient business to warrant the establishment of a through passenger service, Denver to Douglas, and sufficient to keep three or four regular freight trains running daily in each direction. Douglas is the gateway of a vast and fertile country. There are cattle and sheep ranches, galore, oil, coal and soda fields, and millions of acres of irrigable land that will be reclaimed with the completion of the Pathfinder irrigation enterprise.

The Colorado & Southern is already improving its Cheyenne & Northern branch. Eighty-pound steel is replacing the light rails that have been in use for more than a quarter of a century, and now this will be put in, the bridges rebuilt and the roadbed strengthened and ballasted. The round-houses and machine shops here will be enlarged, and new engines and cars will be placed in service on the branch line at once.

But what the Colorado & Southern wishes to do most of all at this time, especially in view of the proposed extension to Douglas, is to lead from Fort Collins to Cheyenne, thus giving them a through line Denver to Douglas. It is stated, however, that the Colorado & Southern is hesitating about filling in the gap Fort Collins to Cheyenne for fear the Union Pacific will build a branch from Greeley to Fort Collins, as has been threatened, and make a bid for some of the business in the Fort Collins section which is now handled exclusively by the Colorado & Southern. However, the Colorado & Southern will probably see that more is to be gained by securing the business of central-eastern Wyoming than by maintaining a monopoly on the Fort Collins business.

The business man talked with leading officials of the Colorado & Southern, and he gave it as his opinion that the Colorado & Southern will build from Fort Collins to Cheyenne, and possibly on to Buffalo and Sheridan, and thence to Montana points, in the spring.

## SPIKE AND RAIL.

Fred Will, Jr., general freight agent of the Denver & Rio Grande, will arrive in Salt Lake tomorrow.

The Missouri Pacific announces that all state quarantine regulations against swine fever have been removed and health certificates are no longer required by passengers.

The main line of the Salt Lake Route via Ninth Street and Fourth West will be open for business in time for the new train which will be put on from Chicago on the first of next month.

Chief Engineer E. J. Vard of the Denver & Rio Grande is still in Salt Lake. Mr. President Charles Schlichte, General Traffic Manager Hughes, however, returned to Denver yesterday.

L. B. Swann, who has been with the Utah Fuel company for some years, has taken a position in the office of the general superintendent of the Oregon Short Line under Chief Clerk Anderson.

Word was received from General Livestock Agent Ben Nevins this morning from Clay Center, Ill., that his mother passed away yesterday and that he arrived from Salt Lake a few hours before her death.

Owing to the growing passenger business to and from the Garfield smelter and the Salt Lake Route has been compelled to put on an extra coach on the noon train. Quite a large crowd went out to view the big project yesterday.

The Iron Mountain Route announces a fast through train to Mexico City has been put on to run semi-weekly in addition to the regular daily through Pullman. The train will be operated over the Iron Mountain Route, Texas & Pacific, International & Great Northern and the National Line of Mexico.

## CONTRIBUTIONS IN AID OF THE JEWS OF RUSSIA.

New York, Nov. 13.—The American fund for the relief of the pillaged Jews in Russia, based on acknowledgments made by the national relief committee, the National Committee on Jewish Relief, is estimated at \$200,000. It is hoped to reach \$1,000,000.

## MILWAUKEE.

Milwaukee, Nov. 12.—Cash subscriptions of \$1,000 toward aiding the suffering Russian Jews at the mass meeting held at Temple Emanuel. The meeting was attended by 200 of the wealthiest Jews in Milwaukee and others.

## CARNEGIE'S CONTRIBUTION.

New York, Nov. 12.—Andrew Carnegie has contributed \$10,000 for the relief of the Jews in Russia. The gift was sent in a letter sent to Isador Straus of this city in which Mr. Carnegie says: "I am only too glad to send you the enclosed as a contribution to the fund for the relief of the Jews in Russia. The terrible crimes being committed there are such as might lead one to lose faith in humanity, but the history of the past shown us scenes of even deeper horror."

"Do not be discouraged, however. Under the law of evolution we must steadily, though slowly, march upward, and finally reach the true conception of the brotherhood of man."

## PHILADELPHIA.

Philadelphia, Nov. 12.—There were five large meetings of Jews in this city today for the purpose of raising funds for the sufferings Jews in Russia. The most important gathering met at Mercantile hall, where \$20,000 was raised in half an hour. Judge Master Sulzberger presided and Dr. Joseph Kruskopof of Keneseth Israel synagogue made the principal address.

A committee of 25 was appointed to make a canvass of the city for more money. Various sums were also contributed at four other meetings held in the Jewish quarters.

## PITTSBURG.

Pittsburg, Nov. 12.—At the Jewish synagogue, which was filled tonight, resolutions of protest were passed, and President Roosevelt was requested to find, if possible, some way to interfere on behalf of the Jewish race in the czar's domain.

The subscriptions for the benefit fund amounted to \$9,500, and \$5,500 in cash was collected from smaller towns of the country. \$1,000 in cash was reported. It is the intention to swell the fund to \$24,000 before Dec. 1.

The big audience pledged to go into mourning for 30 days and to forgo all luxuries and amusements and donate their savings to the relief of their brethren in Russia.

## ST. JOSEPH, MO.

St. Joseph, Mo., Nov. 12.—The three Jewish congregations of this city today raised \$1,500 for the relief of the Russian Jews.

## LOUISVILLE.

Louisville, Nov. 12.—Close to \$4,000 was raised at a meeting held at the Temple Beth Israel tonight on behalf of the Russian Jews.

## KANSAS CITY.

Kansas City, Nov. 12.—At a meeting of Orthodox Jews in this city tonight \$1,500 in cash was raised for the relief of the Jews in Russia.

## Chairmanship for Tawney.

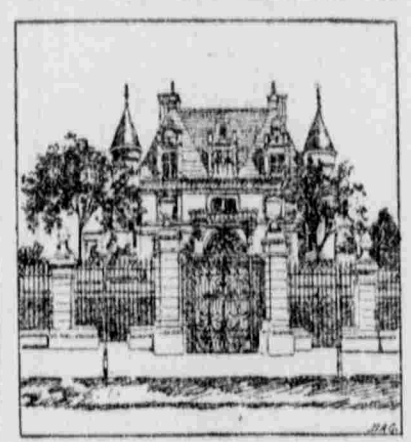

## A STEEL MAGNATE'S HOME.

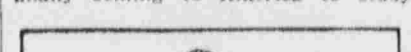
