He Has Issued Permits to the Saengerfest Club.

JEFFRIES - RUHLIN FIGHT.

The Fronble Will in Ail Probability be Settled in the Courts-Two Permits Granted.

Cincinnati, O., Jan. 25.-Mayor Julius Flelschmann today granted the Saengerfest Athletic association a permit to have two sparring matches at the Saengerfest building on February 15 -one of ten rounds and one of twenty.

The committee today called on the mayor and presented its plea that the permit be issued at once. They stated that in view of the fight being made against the proposed contest between Jeffries and Ruhlin to aid in lifting the Saengerfest debt, they did not think that it was just to them that the mayor should withhold his permit untll two days before the fight was sched-

uled to come off. The committee informed the mayor that if a fight were to be made in the courts against the contest it should be done at once. They asserted that the contracts for remodeling the Saengerfest hall had been let and the work was ready to be pushed when the permit was granted. The mayor said that he had not before had these views presented to him. He admitted their force and at once is-

sued the permit. The Saengerfest directors tonight gave out the following statement:

"The sparring contest for the benefit of the Saengerfest club will be held on

the scheduled date, February 15, 1901. The directors of the Saengerfest Athletic association have held strictly to the plans originally outlined. "We propose to act strictly within the law. THE RIGHT OF CHOICE.

Must Intelligent People Bow to the Dictum of Doctors ?

Editor Deseret News:

I was personally referred to by one of the parties to the defense of vaccination as being expert in my profession as an engineer, and that I should thereore allow the doctors to be expert in theirs, and should on that account per mit them to be the best judges of the value of vaccination. This is not stat ing the case correctly. I do not pre-tend to medical knowledge, but I do hope to have some common sense, when I see that England ter a half century's ex nf century's experi mpulsory vaccina ter a ence in compulsory vaccina-tion has been compelled to relax its law on account of its many failures, I am naturally led to inquire what is the

reason for such change of attitude. We will suppose for instance that a certain Mr. Smith requires an engine for a certain purpose. He consults for a certain purpose. He consults me and I advise a certain style of con-struction which I believe to be the best. He then consults another engineer, who is known to have had say ten times the experience that I have had in that class of work, and he advises some other construction for that purpose. Mr. Smith, who perhaps knows noth-ing about the details of machinery, would be very likely to accept the advice of the more experienced engineer, and who could say that he was not

wise in doing so? I have known of just such cases with steamships, where the owners who did not pretend to any knowledge of ma-chinery found that one class of engine while not appearing to be so scientific as another, gave better service with less repairs and consequently was the one that they favored, and I think were

justified in their conclusions. Now in my own case I will not pretend to any practical knowledge of vac-cination, athough I know that almost any plug can do it and be just about as successful in implanting disease as the most experienced practitioner. I find that Alexander von Humboldt,
