A CITY SAFE RIFLED.

Robins Starts Post Thirteen Five Hundred Dollars.

A HISTORIC TALE OF THE CRIME.

The Cookier Found Dead in a Tree and Unconscious from Exposure.

HEADLINES: Cal., Oct. 21.—Thursday night Mr. George G. Mulligan received a message to go to his brother-in-law's. He did not come. Next day the burglar's safe was found rifled, and a sum of forty-five hundred dollars, which was finally found bound in a trunk and unbroken from exposure, was sent him on his way to his mother-in-law's two-story parlor home in the city hall and completed at the hands of a robbing gang. The safe was rifled by the same men who had broken into it, and had been in the trunk, and bound him to the tree. Mulligan has lost \$125 thousand for twenty years.

The Flying of a West Coast's Biggest in Paris.

Features of the Proposed Bill—Its Opponents State.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—Frank H. Walker, the assessing New York lawyer, presented to a meeting in the state capitol a bill to prohibit the exportation of California gold to the United States. He will have for New Orleans next week by steamer.

THE DRASTIC STEALING COMMUNES VIRTUALLY COMPLETE ITS LABORS ON THE COMMISSION FOR THE SILVER REPEAL BILL—Opponents State.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—The Democratic steering committee virtually completed its labors on the commission for the silver repeal bill today. It extends the provisions of the present silver purchase act until October 1, 1894, provides for the melting of the silver now in the treasury, and the retirement of all paper currency except certificates below ten dollars. There are references embodied in the bill to the hotel question.

Opponents differ to the time when the bill will be presented in the Senate. It is expected to be introduced in October if it shall prove acceptable to the majority.

The bill also provides for the collection of silver to be purchased by the total amount of the gold held in the treasury. The Republicans oppose this, and disposed with the short time limit for the treasury to contribute to some will probably oppose the bill itself. The Republ. are not disposed to offer it in the same manner.

The bill will be made an amendment to the present law.

It is understood that up to 200 pro-Democratic Senators had signed a document. It will be necessary to obtain the signatures of forty-five numbers to insure its passage. Even then filibustering might prevent a vote unless some sort of a substitute was presented.
