N. Y. DEMOCRATS OPPOSE FUSION

Means Sacrifice of Political Principles by Both Sides for Temporary Success.

ALWAYS A SHAMEFUL FAILURE

Committee's Address Declares Independence League Movement Personal Exploitation for One Man.

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 17,-An address to the Democrats of the state has been issued by the committee appointed by the recently held Albany Democratic conference. The address declares strongly against fusion. In part, it is as follows.

"The Independence league has held its convention and nominated its ticket and has asked Jefferson Democrats and Lincoln Republicans to support it. There was presented at that convention a petition from a number of men calling themselves Democrats, proposing that there should be a conference between the managers of the Independence league and the Democratic convention looking toward fusion.
"Now fusion, by which two political

parties unite upon the same candidates, usually means a sacrifice of political principles by both sides for the chance of the temporary success. It always is and must be a shameful failure. There is no reason whatever why the Demo-cratic party should be betrayed into fusion; it has principles and should proclaim them. It has pienty of men fit to be named for the state officers to be filled at this election. Let it place them in nomination.

"Still less should the Democratic party submit to being annexed by a movement originating for the personal exploitation of one man, however worthy or worthless the movement and whatever the character of the man

The Democratic party, if it is to be party worthy of respect and fit to be trusted with power, must remain free and independent. It must fight the fight of the people against corruption, against unlawful aggregations of wealth and power, against all forms of unprincipled monopoly and special privileges. But it cannot fight its fight if it destroys itself by merging its identity into that of another party, even temporarily.

"If the party can be kept true to its course we believe it to be on the eve of a great victory. Our political adversa-ries are divided by the bitterest fac-tional differences. Whatever votes the Independence league may draw will be drawn partly from both parties, but principally from that uncertain element which is always ready to try something new and has no fixed political principles of any kind. They will not interfere with the success of the Dem-

"We have the chance of a generation. Let us not throw it away by our own indifference and folly."

GERMAN MANUFACTURERS CALL ON THE PRESIDENT.

Oyster Bay, Sept. 17.—President Roosevelt today received a delegation of manufacturers from Germany, who sought relief from what they considered restrictive legislation in American custom houses against imports from Germany. President Rocevelt referred them to the treasury and state department and indicated he would receive a report regarding the complaints form officials of those departments. CHINESE LABORERS.

Those Working on Panama Canal Will Be Deported When Services Are Over.

Washington, Sept. 17 .- Chinese labor ers taken to Panama for work on the isthmian canal will be required to be deported at the conclusion of their ser-vice. To insure their deportation the Panama government will require the contractors who furnish the Chinese laborers to give a bond of \$50,000 for the first 2,500 Chinamen and \$20 each for laborer in any number in excess of

This information was conveyed to all who have signified their intention of bidding for the contract to supply the Chinese laborers by the isthmian canal commission in the form of the following circular letter sent out tonight: "We are advised by cable that the se-

curity the contractors will be required to give to the Panama government under article 3 of the invitations to furnish Chinese labor, dated Aug. 20, 1906, will be for the first draft of 2,500 laborers a single bond in the approximate penal sum of \$50,000 with penalty that the contractor pay \$100 for each Chinese, which should not be deported at the conclusion of service, the bond to be increased at the rate of \$20 per Chinese for all Chinese on the isthmus at any one time in excess of \$2,500."
