## FRAGMENTS.

PARLEY P. DRAPER and his two young sons were violently thrown from a wagon by a runaway last Saturday, at Mant, Sanpete County. One of the sons was hurt in the arm, and the other badly hurt in the face.

The father, Parley P. Draper, was severely injured, having a rib broken and being hurt across the stomach by the wheel running over him; his right eye and the right side of his face were also injured. Although he received eleven wounds on his body, and though not dangerously hurt, he has his arm somewhat swollen.

It was reported that the fire was caused by a hanging lamp falling to the floor and exploding. It was put out by throwing a sack over the burning oil, and when the fire company arrived there was nothing for them to do but to remove the injured.

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At Hamilton, Kansas, on April 28, a fatal explosion occurred in a brickyard. The separator exploded, with the running at the rate of 400 revolutions an hour. Besides wrecking the building, it fatally injured W. P. Moore, one of the owners of the company, and killed Harry, three years old. Charles and Clark had both been broken and killed in the explosion. The only way to account for the explosion is that the separator was not up to the standard given by the manufacturer, and was made of wrought iron. When it was given a thousand pounds, and shreds of clothing and pieces of flesh were found scattered upon the walls of the ruined building.

## AN ORDINANCE.

Licensing Fresh Meat Dealers.

SECTION 1.—Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City, Utah, that any person who shall engage in the business of selling fresh meat in the city of Salt Lake City, Utah, shall obtain a license from the City Recorder, and pay annually, in advance, the sum of \$2.00 for each license.

SECTION 2.—Every person making application for license under this ordinance shall file with the City Recorder a statement of the amount of sales made, or business done, during the year immediately preceding the year for which license is applied for, and shall also file with the City Recorder a statement of the amount of sales made, or business done, during the year immediately preceding the year for which license is applied for.

SECTION 3.—Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined in any sum not less than one hundred dollars.

SECTION 4.—All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
