### WASHINGTON.

The Oil Trust—Mexican Marauders—  
Democratic Caucus, Etc.

WASHINGTON, April 7. — Messrs  
Oates, Brainerd and other mem-  
bers of the House opposed to the di-  
rect tax bill held a short conference  
this morning touching the present  
deadlock in the House. It is under-  
stood a conclusion was reached that  
the House take a recess from sometime  
today until Monday, maintaining the  
present parliamentary status of the bill  
and that the democratic caucus to light  
should determine the future course of  
the House in the matter.

The Secretary of State is in receipt  
of a dispatch from General Bragg,  
United States Minister to Mexico, re-  
closing a copy of an order from the  
Department of War of Mexico, calling  
attention to the late trespasses on the  
frontier by Mexican troops, and  
saying that despite the severity with  
which the law is enforced, the Mexican  
troops, officers especially, are still  
in the future under the penalty of  
punishment such as the military  
provisions, in case of further violations  
of this character.

The House committee on manufac-  
tures resumed the investigation of the  
oil trust today.

David Kirk, of Bradford, Pennsylv-  
ania, a member of the producer's as-  
sociation, says that the association  
was organized as a protection against  
the Standard Oil Trust. It had 200  
members. After its formation it was  
found a great deal of capital would be  
required to build a new system of pipe  
lines, etc., so negotiations were  
opened with the Standard and an  
agreement reached by the Standard to  
give the association the profits on  
5,000 barrels if the association  
would cut down the production to  
17,500 barrels per day and refrain from  
opening new wells. The first act of  
the association was to sell to se-  
cure the profits of 1,000 barrels for  
the labor affected by the shut down.  
Then they went back to the Standard  
and squeezed another million barrels  
from it for the same purpose. There  
had been a daily average reduction of  
25,000 barrels since the contract had  
been in force. The Standard, the wit-  
ness said, laid every possible obstacle  
in the way of competitors.

Representative Smith asked the wit-  
ness if when the association was  
formed they thought they could by leg-  
islative enactment of Pennsylvania  
compel the Standard Oil Company to  
carry oil to everybody.

Witness said, "Yes, we were suckers  
enough to think so. Certainly  
thought the state could regulate the  
monster they had created." Witness  
thought the pipe lines should be owned  
by the state.

The democratic members of the  
House held a caucus tonight to decide  
upon the policy in the oil trust  
territories. The following resolution  
was adopted on motion of Springer:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this  
caucus that an enabling act for the  
territories of Dakota, Montana, Wash-  
ington and New Mexico should be  
passed at this session, providing for a  
constitutional convention in each Ter-  
ritory, and the submission of those  
constitutions for ratification or re-  
jection at an election in November, 1888,  
substantially as provided for in the bill  
reported by the committee on territor-

ies.

The caucus also adopted a resolu-  
tion requesting the committee on rules  
to fix the time for considering bills  
forfeiting unearned railroad land  
grants, etc.

Just before adjournment a sugges-  
tion was made that a caucus be held  
Monday night for the purpose of tak-  
ing steps to break the existing dead-  
lock in the House. It became appar-  
ent, however, that a dangerous sub-  
ject had been broached, and to prevent  
the possibility of a split in the caucus,  
the matter was dropped.

The subcommittee of the appro-  
priations committee has completed the  
legislative, executive and judicial ap-  
propriation bill.

Col. John H. King (retired), died at  
his home in this city tonight.

### Banquet of the Ohio Society.

New York, April 7.—The gathering at  
Delmonico's tonight was the occasion  
of the third annual banquet of the  
Ohio Society of New York and at the  
same time the centennial anniversary  
of the first settlement of Ohio at  
Marietta on April 7th, 1888.

President Thomas Ewing, arm in arm  
with General W. T. Sherman, led the  
march into the dining room, followed  
by Hon. Chauncey M. Depew, Gen. W.  
Wager Swaine, Ex-Governor George  
Hoadley, Hon. Stephen B. Elkins, Car-  
son Locke, B. F. Fickert, Hon.  
Whiteley Reid, S. F. Avery, Richard  
Butler, A. M. Ferris, W. Cochrane,  
William W. Este, O. J. Shaffer, Wil-  
ham A. Rogers, Hon. William Windom,  
Hon. B. F. Jones, Hon. Murat Hal-  
stead, Hon. J. A. Bristol, George Al-  
fred Townsend, Adm. J. L. Lockwood,  
B. Levis, Adm. C. Thomas, Mayor  
Hewitt, C. C. Shaine, J. S. Taylor, W.  
Eckert, Hon. Charles A. Dana, Ben-  
jamin F. Fevre, Calvin S. Brice, Cornelius N.  
Bliss, and about 200 other gentlemen.  
Letters of regret were read from Gen-  
eral Phil H. Sheridan, Senator John  
Sherman, Governor Hill, Congressman  
Charles H. Grosvenor, Governor Frazar,  
Congressman E. S. Williams, Ex-  
Congressman John E. Follett, Senator  
Allison, Ex-Governor Bishop, M. E.  
Jocelis, John B. McLean, Ex-Senator  
Harrison, of Indiana, Senator Jones,  
of Nevada, Senator Manderson, of  
Nebraska, E. F. Kearney and Senator  
Plumb of Kansas. It was after 9  
o'clock when the speaking began and  
General Thomas Ewing was the principal  
speaker.

The Situation in Germany.

BERLIN, April 7.—Prince Alexander  
of Battenberg comes to Charlottenburg  
next Tuesday, and his betrothal to  
Princess Victoria takes place early in  
June. Prince Bismarck has withdrawn  
his resignation solely from the consid-  
eration that Germany, under the dom-  
ination of the Emperor, would lead to a speedy break-up of German  
unity. Nothing since the accession of  
Emperor Frederick has occurred to  
have so strongly animated the Prussian  
Conservatives against the Emperor as  
the marriage question. All of the rad-  
ical newspapers treat the Battenberg  
question with disdain, as of no conse-  
quence to Germany's policy, and re-  
gard the fact that Battenberg is only  
one chord in the general discord struck  
by the party of the Emperor.

The residence of the Berlin press in  
referring to court intrigues has been  
greater than was required by reference  
to the Emperor and the leading officials  
of State. Battenberg's marriage be-  
comes almost a minor incident in the  
court intrigues. Among other suc-  
cessful schemes, the Em-  
peror has been induced to send to  
Count Von Moltke a series of state-  
ments on the condition of the army,  
followed by the request that the Gen-  
eral be present at meetings of the  
Commission on reforms in the army.  
Count Von Moltke replied it would be  
impossible for him to preside over the  
Commission without knowing how it  
was constituted and what reforms  
were desired. Consequently the Com-  
mission has been dropped. Another  
move of the party of the Emperor is  
to overrule the diplomatic appoint-  
ments.

Tonight's National Zeitung says cir-  
cumstances may arise under which  
Bismarck will no longer oppose the  
union. This, it may be, would mean  
the postponement of the affair until  
the political objections now raised  
cease to operate. The visit of the  
Queen of England to Charlottenburg,  
place, will take place as arranged,  
but the betrothal will not be publicly  
brought forward. This is an official  
statement and simply means Bismarck's  
advice has been overruled.

The Queen of England comes here  
with her Battenberg protegee to carry  
out her family projects without re-

gard to the sentiments of the German  
nobility or the German people, and  
equally regardless that her daughter,  
the Empress, thwarts the policy of the  
minister (Bismarck) who made her  
Empress, and without whom Imperial  
Germany might cease to be. Bismarck  
in his position does not rely on the  
military party. He has the support of  
the whole country and of the royal  
house of the German federation. He is  
really master of the situation.

Today's bulletin says the malady from  
which the Emperor is suffering now  
appears to be moving from the back of  
the larynx more to the front, which is  
regarded by physicians as a favorable  
symptom, because the danger of the  
disease attacking the esophagus will  
thus be avoided.

The Emperor will go to Posen on  
Monday to inquire into the condition  
of the sufferers by the floods. Dreadful  
accounts have been received from  
Posen. Two hundred and fifty villages  
are in ruins and 15,000 persons are  
without shelter. When the dykes at  
Warthe gave way a large number of  
lives were lost. The losses of live stock  
is incalculable. A famine is threat-  
ened in Posen, Pomerania and Silesia,  
and the number of persons emigrating  
to America will soon be enormously  
increased.

### Centennial Celebration.

MARIETTA, Ohio, April 7.—The City  
Hall was too small to accommodate  
the throng that gathered on this beau-  
tiful morning to celebrate the one  
hundredth anniversary of the landing  
of General Rufus Putnam and his land-  
ing party from the *Mayflower*. The first  
formal part of the programme today  
was the address of welcome by Gov-  
ernor Foraker, who alluded warmly to  
the memories they were celebrating,  
particularly the effective good works  
of Manasseh Cutler and his associates  
and to the brave and patriotic action  
of the soldiers in the Revolution, and  
securing as a condition precedent to  
their occupation of the soil of the  
great northwestern territory, its first  
organic law that immortal instrument,  
the Ordinance of 1787, and the gen-  
erosity, liberal, patriotic action of Vir-  
ginia and South Carolina, Georgia  
and Delaware in voting as they did  
by their representatives in the old  
Confidential Congress, that slavery,  
although a domestic institution  
with them, should not be allowed  
to put its blighting light on this fair  
heritage. Hon. Geo. F. Hoar, United  
States Senator from Massachusetts,  
was the orator of the day.

After the oration of Senator Hoar  
was delivered, ex-President Hayes  
was called out and made a brief ad-  
dress which was spirited and eloquent.  
He was followed by Bernard Peters,  
editor of the Brooklyn Times, in a  
graphic sketch of the German pioneers.  
In the afternoon seven over-  
sight meetings were held in the churches,  
while at the City Hall Hon. J. Ran-  
dolph Tucker made an oration. He  
was followed by Rev. E. E. Hale.
