FIFTY-FOURTH YEAR.

Charges Against Senator Smoot To Be Investigated

AN INVESTIGATION
DETERMINED UPON.

Senate Committee Will Proceed to Inquire in Charges Against Senator Smoot.

RESOLUTION TO BE PRESENTED.

Authorities Chairman Burrows to Ask the Senate for Certain Authority.

WITNESSES AND DOCUMENTS.

They Will Be Sent for If Upper House of Congress Complies with Request.

Washington, Jan. 23.—The senate committee on privileges and elections today determined to enter upon an investigation into the charges against Senator Smoot in connection with the state and authorized Senator Burrows, chairman of the committee to present a resolution in the senate permitting the committee to send for witnesses and documents.

The committee did not attempt to decide how extensive the inquiry should be, saving that point for future determination. Some of the members of the committee express the opinion that when the investigation is once entered upon it will be impossible to prevent opening the doors wide and going into all the points thoroughly. They agree, however, with the more conservative members, that it is wise to leave the extent of the work to be done to future developments. The resolution probably will be introduced in the senate Monday, and as it will be presented as the unanimous action of the committee, it is not probable that it will be antagonized. It will be in the usual form of such resolution.

The senate committee had before it Senator Smoot's amended reply to the specific charges made by Mr. Taylor at the meeting on the 18th instant, and it was agreed that the charges and the reply constitute a sharply joined issue, especially on the point as to the interests of the "Mormon" Church in temporal affairs. Members of the committee expressed the opinion that this and the charge that Mr. Smoot is a polygamist will constitute the principal points of inquiry.

LT. C. W. FLAKE.

Reported to Have Been Killed by Hostile Mores.

Manila, Jan. 23.—A report has been received from Manila to the effect that Lieut. Captain W. Flake, had been killed and that Lieut. William E. Roberts and Private Fay had been badly wounded when sat on a scouting expedition against unfriendly Mores. All of the men were in the Twenty-second Infantry.

CHICAGO MASONIC TEMPLE.

Fire in it Caused a Great Deal of Excitement.

Chicago, Jan. 23.—Fire broke out in the sky scraper, one square east of the Lincoln theater, owing to the fact that upwards of 1,000 people occupy the offices and stores in the giant structure the fire caused great excitement.

SENATOR BURTON INDICTED.

Charged With Receiving Money From Rialto Grain Co.

St. Louis, Jan. 23.—The federal grand jury today returned an indictment against Joseph H. Burton, United States senator from Kansas, charging him on nine counts with accepting \$10,000 from the Rialto Grain & Securities company, while a United States senator for his alleged services in negotiating with the postmaster general, chief police inspector and other high officials of that office to induce them to render a favorable decision in matters affecting the permission of the Rialto company to use the name.

Mal. Hugh C. Dennis, president of the company, and W. B. McNamee, associated with him, are named in the indictment, as are the men who made the kickback asked.

NEEDS OF THE PHILIPPINES.

Ex-Governor Taft Says That at Present It Is Railroad Development.

ISLANDS NEVER MORE TRANQUIL

Election of a Legislative Assembly Will Soon Be Authorized By Commission.

San Francisco, Jan. 23.—Ex-Gov. William H. Taft of the Philippines arrived here this morning on the steamer Korea. He was accompanied by Mrs. Taft, their two children, F. W. Carpenter, his private secretary, and Carson Taylor, secretary of the Philippine St. Louis commission. Immediately upon arrival in the harbor, Gov. Taft and party were transferred to the government tug Slocum, which proceeded with all dispatch to the Oakland mole, where the Atlantic express was held in waiting to start the moment the distinguished passenger was on board.

In conversation with a representative of the Associated Press, he said: "I am looking forward," he said, "to a period of great activity in the railroad building throughout the islands. English and American capital has so far controlled the field, but the people of the islands are anxious for the introduction of American capital, which so far has not been forthcoming."

"This may be due to the fact that it is too much occupied in other branches of industry or perhaps investors in this country are too afraid, lacking the experience of English promoters in dealing with financial matters in the Orient."

One American syndicate, headed by Mr. Swift of Detroit, is now engaged in the construction of electric railroads, gridironing the streets of Manila, with the object in view of extensions which will connect the suburban points.

"Two new branch lines will just be authorized by the government on the 21st of January, extending 21 miles on the line of the road now running out for a distance of 129 miles from Manila to Dagupan. This road was originally built by the Spanish.

New York, Jan. 23.—President Woodrow Wilson of Princeton university, speaking on "Americanism" before the Outlook club of Mont Clair, N. J., on Monday last, resulting in three days on Monday, has told the conductor of the work train, guilty of criminal negligence, to complete its arrangements.
