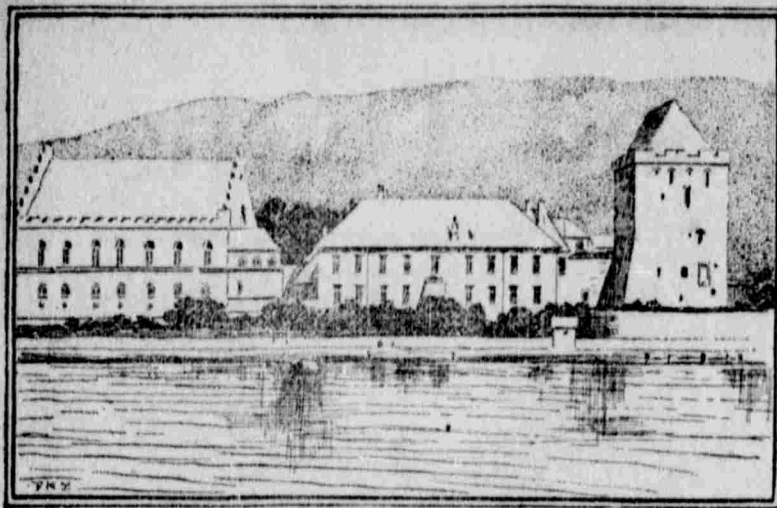


OLDEST BUILDING IN NORWAY SAVE ONE.



Haakon hall, herewith shown, is the oldest building in the kingdom of Norway, with a single exception. That is the cathedral at Trondhjem. The hall is in Bergen, Norway's chief maritime city. As shown in the cut, the hall is at the left, the commander's house is in the center and the Walkendorf tower is at the right. The whole group of buildings is to be reconstructed for the new king's use. The royal family will reside in the central building, and the hall will be used for festivals and great occasions.

Chinese Proverbs—One to Fit Every Case, Says Dr. Smith.

THERE is no surer test of the real feelings of a people than their proverbial sayings, those "gems which on the stretched forefinger of all Time sparkle forever." That China is no exception to this rule might have been supposed even if we had no direct proof, says the North China Herald. Proverbial expressions are very common in China. Dr. Arthur Smith says that "common talk," the nearest approach to "proverb" in Chinese, is "literally in the mouth of every one, from the emperor upon his throne to the women grinding at the mill."

Native proverbs relating to legal affairs divide themselves roughly into three classes—first, those more or less common to all people, and dealing with that "once bitten twice shy" sort of wisdom which leads a man to put

up with evils rather than go to law. Such, for example, are the following: If one family has a lawsuit 10 families are involved in calamity. If but one word of information against a man gets into the court, nine bullocks cannot drag it out again. Let householders avoid litigation, for once go to law and there is nothing but trouble.

Win your lawsuit and lose your money. Instances of this kind might be multiplied. But we must pass on to the second class—those referring specially to the mandarins; and here it may be said that though the majority of the proverbial sayings are not complimentary, there are a few to bear witness to the good that a good man may do even in an official capacity. While others give pointed advice—e. g., "Never beat if you must fine; if you do, all fines decline." Most, however, as is natural, deal with the seamy side. The following are a few specimens:

No punishment on the bench, no law below it. Deceive, but don't insult a mandarin. Men's hearts are like iron, and the rule of the mandarins like a furnace. Even an honest Chin-fulmay, during the three years' terms of office, saves 10 myriads snow-white tales of silver. Before he comes into office he repays a thousand faults; after he comes into office he commits the same himself. Quickly pay your taxes, even if he should empty your purse; then you will be most happy. Wishing to criminate no difficulty will be met in finding a pretext. Of ten reasons by which a magistrate may decide a case, nine are unknown to the public. With only right back you, sure the yamens lack you. Yamens are deep as the sea; and their corruptness lofty as heaven. In life beware of yamens; in death beware of hell.

Cape Cod Canal, Will Give Inside From New York to Boston.

Canal to a New Yorker means one of two things. It suggests the Panama or the Erie specimen. Ten to one he has never heard that a Cape Cod canal was even thought of.

But it is. Dredges will soon be put to work at the job of cutting a 10-mile ditch across the Massachusetts peninsula.

Government statistics show that about 40,000 vessels rounded Cape Cod during the year ended March 31, 1899. They represented a registration of over 23,000,000 tons. Records of 20 years show that about 150 vessels went down off the cape, involving a loss of about 65 lives and \$1,600,000 worth of property.

Next to Cape Hatteras this is the

most dangerous part of the coast. In addition, Vineyard sound is fogbound for nearly 100 days out of each year. With the new ship canal all these difficulties will be avoided, and 120 miles, by the outside route, or 70 miles by the sound route, will be saved.

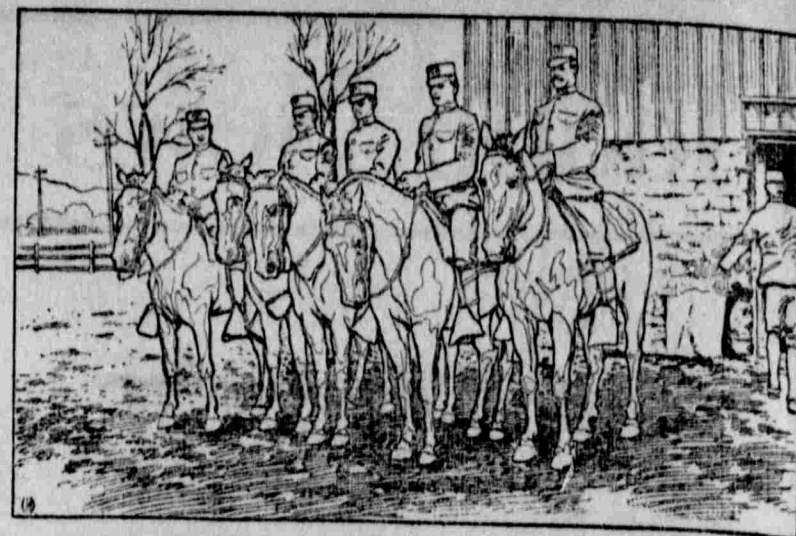
The scheme has been talked of for more than two centuries. From Buzzard's bay to Cape Cod bay, says the Electric Magazine, the distance at several points is hardly 10 miles. The soil is sandy and is believed to be free from rock ledges calculated to impede excavation. Most of the work can be done by dredging.

Under the Massachusetts charter, and with a capital of \$6,000,000 and authorized bonds of an equal amount, the Boston, Cape Cod and New York Canal company has been purchasing its right of way. The plans have been

made so that, as business may warrant an appeal for a greater capacity to accommodate tonnage, the waterway may be both widened and deepened without excessive cost. Organization completed, right of way purchased, surveys of the route made and engineering plans laid, dredging and excavation will start before long, and the backers of the undertaking are confident that two years and a half will witness the completion and opening of the waterway.

Provisions have been put, by the state of Massachusetts, into the charter of the company to safeguard the people. By the present charter the state retains the privilege of purchasing the entire interest of the canal company at the end of 10 years by the payment of the cost of construction and an allowance of 10 per cent added

as full compensation. The state also reserves the right to limit the profit of the canal company beyond 10 per cent per annum, thus fairly protecting the public against the possibility of excessive tolls at any time.
