Commercial Club Election-Th

The FINEN'S FUND SCANDAL COMES UP Headliner at Last Night's Session Of the City Council, Proves Somewhat Mediocre.

CHIEF GLORE'S LETTER FILED.

Communication Responsible for the Attendance of City Attorney Dininny Who Delivers His Opinion.

The only feature of last night's adjourned meeting of the city council which tended to save it from being a good sleep inducer, was the discussion of the communication from Fire Chief Glore, regarding the absence of the firemen's fund together with its custodian, ex-Chief Charles T. Vail. The communication from Chief Glore was communication from Unier Giore was sent to the committee on fire and po-lice, some time ago, and last night came up for action, together with a complaint from the same department concerning the crippling of the fire fighting force by the ordinance which says that a certain detail of firemen shall attend theatrical performances. The former communication attracted The former communication attracted the instant attention of the council members, as that also of City Attorney Dininny, whose presence at the meet-ing was at once explained by the read-

ing of the letter. Councilmen Hall and Holly were in favor of complying with the demands of Chief Glore and taking steps which of Chief Glore and taking steps which would insure the return of the absent Vall, with or without the missing money, and while Councilman L. D Martin was strongly in favor, so he sald, of having Vall returned to Salt Lake, to explain what he had done with the more the absence of which Mrs. the money, the absence of which Mrs Vall has accounted for by saying that

Vali has accounted for by saying that it was loaned to "American" party managers, he, of course, having the good of the city at heart, could do noth-ing but oppose any such proposition because City Attorney Dininny was le-gally of the opinion that the city would have no right to cause the arrest and extradition of the missing Vall.

ADROITLY SIDESTEPPED.

The action of last night with regard to the missing ex-official, can be taken as nothing short of a marked disin-clination on the part of "American" party leaders to dodge the issue of the party leaders to dodge the issue of the missing firemen's fund, but it is also true that "coming events cast their shadows before," and it is being free-ly predicted that Vali will yet be forced to return and toll what he did with the money in the fund committed to his care, which Chief Glore, in his com-munication, says was \$3,753,80. The difficulty, from a legal stand-point, advanced by the city attorney, in the way of forcing an accounting from Vail, lies in the fact that at the time of the removal from office of Vail by the mayor, the members of the fire department signed a letter asking that

department signed a letter asking that the fund remain in the hands of the deposed chief. This letter, it is said by the city attorney, acts as a present bar to prosecution by the city. The action of the committee finally

resolved itself into a decision to file the letter of Chief Glore, and inform him of the opinion of the city attorney. J. E. Darmer appeared before the council, and registered a complaint with the license committee regarding the license paid by junk dealers. The complaint of the collectors of junk is, that the license charged them by the city is \$300, while that collected from the second hand dealers is but

\$45, while the business carried on by both is very much the same. The discussion which followed led to a general understanding that the
