PROF. ANDRE DIES IN POVERTY.

Pathetic Passing of One of Salt Lake's Best Known Music Teachers, Whose Spirit Took Its Flight at the County Infirmary Last Night.



Prof. Andre Delorme, the well known music teacher, died at the county poor house last night, at 9:20, from apoplexy, following rheumatism and paralysis. He was fatally stricken Wednesday afternoon, and as he was entirely without means, the police took charge of him and removed him to the infirmary, where he steadily faded. The sufferer was a very proud man, and never made a point of taking the public into his confidence, preferring to hear his griefs alone in silence, and working manfully to support himself. He was a resident of this city for 20 years, and taught music, French, German and Spanish, and fencing. He was never without pupils, and for his musical world he was a good instructor. But he at times complained of the lack of means of his patrons in coming forward with the tuition.

De'Orme came over from France on the same vessel with Elder John Nicholson, who made his acquaintance when as the young man was an accomplished linguist, and his services were of much value in translating the elder Nicholson. But he was reserved and seemed very proud. It is understood that he came from an aristocratic French family, though what the differences were that sent him out to this country from home and kindred are not known. The professor was conspicuous on the streets with his tall, erect figure, flaring mustache and white cap, and made his headquarters at Ferguson's music store. Had it been known that his friends would have seen to it that he was properly cared for, but he never said a word, hence none knew of his condition. However, it is believed that his friends will see that he is saved from a pauper's grave. The deceased was single, and was for some time the local French consular agent.

WRIGHT DIED UNDER A CLOUD.

Man Passes Away in Ogden Suspected of Having Robbed a Chattanooga Ticket Office Ten Months Ago—May Have Been Innocent, However.

Nashville, Tenn., July 24.—News has been received here of the death in Ogden of Fred S. Wright, who left Chattanooga 10 months ago. He was a stenographer in the Queen & Crescent ticket office and was the last man seen in the office just prior to the time the safe was opened and about \$1,000 taken. He could not be found the next day. Wright was working for the railroad when he died and breathed his last at the railroad hospital.

SCHOOL BOARD NOT SATISFIED

Thinks Recent Levy is Not Sufficient to Meet Requirements.

Matter Will be Laid Before Attorneys With Object in View of Forcing an Increase.

The board of education met as a committee of the whole last night and discussed the tax levy for city schools as recently made by the board of county commissioners. It was the general opinion that 5.2 mills will not raise enough to carry the schools through the coming school year and that unless something is done to induce the commissioners to increase the levy the schools will have a reputation of the school year of 1903-4. It was, therefore, decided at the meeting last night to place the matter in the hands of some attorney to ascertain whether or not the board would have a standing in the courts to compel the commissioners to make such a levy as would meet the demands of the schools for the coming term.

Last April the board of education asked for a levy which would raise \$100,000 for maintaining the schools the coming term. The county commissioners fixed the levy at 5.2 mills to raise that amount, but the board claims that such a levy will not raise the required amount. It is claimed that a deduction of 4 per cent should be made for uncollectable taxes. That percentage amounts to \$5,000 and hence the board claims that it will run short that amount and unless something is done the schools will have to resort to charity again next spring. Rather than that the board will take the matter in court. If the attorneys decide that it could make a case, unless the county commissioners increase the levy voluntarily.

McKay HAS THE KEYS.

It was stated after the board meeting last night that Prof. G. N. McKay, former principal of the Lovell school, still retains the keys to the building. It could make a case, unless the county commissioners increase the levy voluntarily.
