HEYBURN FILIBUSTERING AGAINST SMOOT BILL

Washington, May 18.--Senator Hey-burn of Idaho, today sent out an alarm that he would talk to the end of the session rather than permit the adoption of a conference report on the bill to provide an enlarged homestead. The bill as passed by the senate limited the in-crease homstead of 320 cares of non-irrigable, arid and semi-arid land, and the house struck out "arid and semi-arid land."

Mr. Heyburn charged that the bill was a land grabbing measure, permit-ting a single settier to take 320 instead of 160 acres of non-irrigable land, which in Idaho, he said, would fuclude land that does not need irrigation, so that the restriction against non-irrigable land was without effect. "If the senate has any business it de-sires to attend to in the near future, I would suggest that consideration of this report be deferred," he said. He in-sisted that if the bill was to be passed it be amended excepting idaho. He thought the senators from California had the same objection to it that be had always supposed the views of a senator were consulted in enacting legSlation affecting his state.

Senator Newlands interposed to say he understood that the two Idaho sena-tors were alvided on this subject but Mr. Borgh disavowed the attitude, say-ing that as the bill had been amended he was opposed to it. Senator Filmi insisted that California objected to the report, that it was un-jusly increasing the homestead from 160 to 320 acres. Mir. Hoyburn proceeded to make good his threat to talk the session to a close and after an hour had passed Mr. Nelson, of Minnesota, sug-gested to Senator Smoot that the con-ference report be withdrawn and that course was followed.
