WHISKY QUESTION FINALLY SETTLED

Solicitor-General Bowers Submits Opinion to President as To What Term Means.

DEFINITION NOT VERY CLEAR.

Adding of Harmless Coloring or Fla voring Matter Does Not Destroy its Character.

Washintgon, June 7.-Lloyd W. Fowers, solicitor-general of the United States, today submitted to President Taft his opinion as to what the term

"whisky" means in law. In effect, Solicitor-General Bowers holds, after discussing at great length what the term "whisky" meant at the time of the passage of the pure food time of the passage of the pure food law, that the public does not consider that added coloring or flovoring mat-ter can make whisky out of what otherwise is not whisky. Whisky is regarded generally and naturally as having a flavor and properties of its own.

"There is no more reason for say-ing alcohol becomes like some true rolored and flavored like some true whisky than for saying that alcohol be-romes brandy because colored or flav-ored like some brandy." He said. "On the other hand, the mere addi-tion of harmless coloring or flavoring matter to what is previously whisky does not destroy its whisky character unless such addition unduly dilutes or affects the essential properties of the whisky.

COLORING AND FLAVORING.

"Whisky having been in all its his-ory extensively and variously colored ad flavored by addition of extraneous and havored by addition of extrained and flavoring matter, such coloring and flavoring monot be considered illegitimate or facompatible with the name whisky. "Such mixtures have been made most extensively for a long period and have become a most popular form of the beverage both in the United States and England. "It is true that a larger quantity of

"It is true that a larger quantity of these mixtures than of straight whisky was consumed during the last 20 years

or more." This mixture of whisky with alchol or neutral spirits is entitled to the name "whisky." Mr. Bowers holds, providing the mixture retains a sub-stantial amount of by-products in pro-portion to the volume of the mixture, giving distinct flavor and properties. He says the addition of alcohol to whisky is not the introduction of a foreign substance, but is merely an enlargement of the proportion of one proper constituent. It is merely a form of dilution, just as the addition of , water is, vater is.

VARIATION OF STRENGTH.

Continuing, Mr. Bowers says: "So long as the mixed articles varies only in respect of being stronger or weaker, without losing distinctive flavors and properties in substantial degree, and consequently the article had not been altered in its essential nature, it can-not be said that the public has been giving the name whisky to an article in ignorance of its character or under delusion concerning the thing to which the name whisky was applied. Even a

delusion concerning the thing to which the name whisky was applied. Even a compound article made by the com-bining of two things, through applica-tion to it by the public of a single distinctive name, acquires the full right to that name. In such case the es-tablished distinctive name describes the compound article: and the pure food act recognizes this, it being pro-vided in that act that "in the case of mixtures or compounds which may be known as articles of food, under their own distinctive name, and not an im-liation of or offered for sale under the distinctive name of another article." the use of such name shall not be a nisbranding.

WHISKY AND ALCOHOL.

WHISKY AND ALCOHOL. "Whisky mixed with alcohol cannot be imitation of other whisky while it still retains the requisite amount of by-products of the distillation from grain, because it is identical with un-mixed whisky under the description which I have given of it, and mixed whisky which remains identical in con-stitution and, character with another article properly called whisky cannot in its own use of the name whisky be said to be using the distinctive name of the other identical article." Solicitor-General Bowers holds that the name whisky has no different scope whether it be used as a drug or as a beverage. He also holds that the contention that whisky may be made from molasses is incorrect. While the opinion of Mr. Bowers is not final and may be overturned by subsequent pro-ceedings, it is a distinct viceory for the contention of blended whisky distiller-ics and is a reversal of the position heretofore taken by the department of agriculture. The opinion is very voluminous, con-

heretofore taken by the department of agriculture. The opinion is very voluminous, con-sisting of thousands of pages of testi-mony and an opinion of Solicitor-Gen-eral Bowers. President Taft author-ized the opinion of Mr. Bowers to be made public, but announced no opinion himself because it was his desire to hear further testimony taken from what are known as "straight whisky" distillers.
