OGDEN.

Ogden, Aug. 15.—One of the events of the week was the celebration of the eighth anniversary of their wedding celebrated by Mr. and Mrs. John F. Fife at their residence, No. 200 Twenty-first street on Monday evening. Mr. and Mrs. Fife are each septuagenarians. They were married Aug. 10, 1838, and have lived in happiness since they contracted the vows which united their destinies. That they are now past their half century mark of matrimony testifies and still retain the same sincere devotion for each other as is evidenced by their family reunion today, in which all the children living and the grandchildren joined.

John Fife was born in Oloca, Clockman, Scotland, in 1834, and is filled with pride for his ancestry, which dates back centuries. He was born on the estate of the famous Earl of Mar, who made the six weeks' retreat before the overwhelming and victorious English hosts at the dawn of the English ascendancy. Mr. Fife's ancestors had been born and reared on the same estate antedating the time of the famous battle.

Mrs. Fife was born at Dysart, Scotland, four years previous to when her husband saw the light of the world, in 1834. They were married in Scotland, coming soon after to America. In 1859 they came as far as the Union Pacific was then built, to Laramie, Wyoming, after which they decided to make their fortunes in the little known wilds of Utah. Those days the trails were filled with dangers of all kinds, but they braved them, many Indians lurking upon their trail, but they were fortunately, without being attacked. They traveled by ox team, a long trip with many strange experiences. When they arrived here they immediately entered into the spirit of the upbuilding of a great state and have been prominently connected with the advancement of the general welfare of Utah.

Mr. Fife, soon after arriving in Ogden entered into the quarry business and is considered one of the experts in that line. He has reached the age when he feels it necessary to retire from

business and now is spending the remainder of his days peacefully with his wife.
