That means that if any trade or union wanted to raise the rate Beport Made at County Horticultural Meeting-Ravages of Fruit Pests. At the meeting of the Salt Lake County Horficultural society, held in the county commissioners' rooms on Saturday afternoon, it was reported that the heavy windstorm of last week did considerable damage to the fruit crop. The wind made the Elbertas look crop. The wind made the Elbertas look as though they had the "yellows," stat-ed one member of the society. The peach blight is reported as being rath-er troublesome. It appears as a shrunker troublesome. It appears as a shrunk-en and black section on a limb of the tree and spreads until the tree is killed. The codling moth is also quite thick, but the aphias and pear and cherry slugs are not as bad as first reported. Much regret was expressed that fruit-growers were not better informed on the matte of spreading and the nature the matte of spraying and the nature of fruit pests. The spraying would do away with a great many of the pests if properly actended to. The cherry crop is reported as being very heavy. The reported as being very heavy. 1 WANT THEM OUT.

Friends of Duke and Robertson Work. ing for Their Pardon.

The friends of Alexander A. Robertson and Harry T. Duke, the two Wells Fargo bank officiais who are now serving a four-year term in the state prison for embezziement, are taking steps to secure the pardon of the two man,

to secure the paraon of the two men, and a petition to be presented to the state board of pardons will soon be circulated around town for signatures. The first year of their sentence ex-pires on July 19. After deducting the "copper" that is allowed for good be-havior, the men only have to serve two years and ten months. Both have been model prisoners and actions have been model prisoners and neither has a single mark against him for an infraction of the prison rules. Robertson is librarian and Duke is a dairyman. They are both hopeful that a pardon will be granted them. The petition may not be presented to the board of hay not be presented to the board of pardons for a couple of months, but it is believed by the friends of the men that it will be granted when it is pre-sented.
