In 1873 his wife died, leaving him with seven small children, to whom he showed a noble devotion, keeping the family together-except the youngest child, an infant, who was reared by Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Liddiard-and trying, so far as possible, to diminish the great loss sus-tained by his children in the death of their mother. He had much of the frontiersman in his nature, was honand fearless and greatly beloved by his children and respected by many friends for his many good qualities.
