First District Court Notes.

This morning a jury was called in the suit of the People vs George Hartley charged with rape. Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Thurnau presented and Warner & Knight appeared for defendant. The case was submitted with closing arguments of Franklin Green, Salt Lake county, & Justice of the Peace, was admitted to argument.

Judge Stevenson was Peter Hansen, two large trials were held on Saturday, one of which was brought up by two litigants regarding grand juries. The crime consists of stealing a large sum from James Harvey and a sum from C. F. Neasey, of Monroe, last October. C. F. Neasey's application for a writ of habeas corpus was denied, the writer March 1.

James Christensen, of Salt Lake county, was arraigned on a charge of forgery, the same was denied.

John W. Hartley, Farview, has brought suit for divorce against Anna Parker. The parties intermarried in Salt Lake City in April, 1882, and three years afterward living as the man and woman, was separated at that time. The husband was convicted of embezzlement in the First district court in the December term of 1894, and serving a sentence in the penitentiary. For this reason plaintiff has a cause of action for divorce for the conduct of the parties.

Judge Hartley, after examining his options as to the damage estimate in the case of J. F. Givens vs the Brooklyn Bridge Co., Plaintiff was awarded \$10,000.

In the case of the H. C. W. Railway Company vs W. F. Young, the party brought in a verdict of no cause of action.
