In a quiet way, there has been in this community for more than fifty years a man of remarkable mechanical bility, whose home is filled with many curious examples of his ingenuity. His name is Oloff Pilquest, and with long and silvery white hair and flowing heard, he carries his four score and more years lightly. Mr. Pilquest, who now resides on Chatham Street, came to Pittsburg from Sweden in 1836, and has since been engaged as a watchmaker, pattern and mould maker. His improvements in machinery and in their are known everywhere among mechanics, and he has almost constantly been engaged in de-signing new inventions. 


