

JAPAN FACES GRAVE SITUATION

Seeks Great Britain's Support to Put Stop to Boycott by Joint Representatives to China.

NATIVE PRESS IS BLAMED.

Consistent Effort Being Made to Bring Western Influence to Bear on Tokio Government.

Peking, May 1.—It was understood today by Chinese officials that the purpose of the Washington authorities in dividing the American battleship fleet into two squadrons is to enable the vessels to visit Japan and China simultaneously, and the feeling of disappointment has in a measure been lessened. The impression prevails among the Chinese, however, that what they call the definite purpose of the fleet's presence in Asiatic waters have been followed by an attempt to neutralize the political interpretation that has been given to the fleet's movements in the far east, particularly at this time when China's difficulties are increasing.

Japan is facing a serious situation as a result of the boycott arising from the Tatsu Maru incident. Admiral Ijima, of the Japanese navy, whose cruiser squadron is now anchored off Taku, was received in audience by the emperor and empress dowager. Confident of the support of the Japanese government, Admiral Ijima is seeking the support of Great Britain to put a stop to the boycott by joint representation to China. The boycott is increasing and Japan is not satisfied with China's efforts to put an end to it.

The Japanese authorities here attribute the growth of the movement to the native press, which is without control and which has been conducting a campaign to make generally known the Chinese side of the incident. They claim that the matter has been misrepresented and hold the vicerey of Canton chiefly responsible because of the enormous commercial influence of the Cantonese.

The diplomatic representatives of the powers here are of the opinion that organized anti-foreign movements in China are a common thing and they now recognize that the powers should have interfered to put an end to the Chinese boycott of 1905 on American goods. They feel the same way with regard to the Japanese boycott although on account of the policy she has pursued on the mainland, Japan has few, if any, sympathizers.

China, by means of a campaign in the foreign and native press making an intelligent and consistent effort to bring western influence to bear on Japan, has succeeded in making the boycott a serious matter and connects it with what the Japanese call the "American championing of China's independence," and the agitation of Englishmen in the far east against the Anglo-Japanese alliance.

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CHINESE EXCLUSION.

Alleged Order Has Been Issued to Sort of Let Up.

Washington, May 1.—It is expected that when the house in its consideration of the sundry civil bill reaches the paragraph appropriating \$500,000 for enforcement of the Chinese exclusion law, which may be tomorrow, Representative Champ Clark of Missouri will offer an amendment to increase the appropriation to \$600,000, and this move will make way for a discussion intended to expose an alleged administration order directing federal officials to relax their vigilance and wink at the unlawful entry of Chinamen into the United States territory for the purpose of prostituting the Chinese government and inducing an abatement of the boycott declared by Chinese merchants against American goods.

It is understood that Mr. Clark and Mr. Fitzgerald of New York, who is a member of the appropriations committee, which made up the sundry civil bill, and others will quote from and dilate on the testimony given before the appropriations committee in executive session on March 24 last, by Frank H. Sargent, commissioner-general of immigration and naturalization. In his testimony, Mr. Sargent said that until two years ago he annually asked for an appropriation of \$600,000 for enforcement of the exclusion act, but that in July of 1906, coincidentally with the institution of the Chinese boycott, "he declined the last year which made a change in the conditions."

TWO BATTLESHIPS.

the construction of the two battleships authorized by the bill. The house naval affairs committee at a meeting today preliminary to the house-senate conference on the amended bill discussed the various senate amendments and informally reached an understanding as to which of them ought to be accepted. As the three house conferees are members of the naval committee, the understanding reached may be accepted as indicating the position to be taken by the members of the conference. The amendment making appropriation for two battleships was wholly satisfactory to the committee.

SECREARY TAFT SAILS FOR PANAMA

Charleston, S. C., May 1.—Secy. of War Taft and party sailed for Panama on the naval transport Prairie today. Accompanied by General Soutter R. L. Rogers of the Isthmian canal commission and W. W. Mischler of the secretary's office, Secy. Taft reached this city this morning. The train over the Atlantic coast line bearing the party was delayed by a freight wreck about 70 miles north of Charleston. When the party finally arrived at the union station, Mayor Rhett and Lieut. Shapley and Ensign Dexter of the Prairie and Collector of the Port William D. Crum were among those who greeted them. At the secretary's request he was driven to the home of Mayor and Mrs. Rhett, whose guest he was for an hour. At the customs house he was met by the officers of the Prairie and then entered a launch and was taken directly to the Prairie, which sailed at noon. The party expect to reach Panama on the morning of May 5.

MURDERED BY ROBBERS.

Nathan Wolff, Portland Pawnbroker, First Shot Then Beaten.

Portland, Or., May 1.—Nathan Wolff a pawnbroker and jeweler who has been in business in Portland for 25 years, was murdered by robbers to-night. Wolff evidently was first shot in the neck and then beaten to death with a hatchet. His face and head were literally hacked to pieces. There is no doubt that robbery was the only motive for the crime. The "pile" safe and cash drawer had been rifled, but the jewelry safe apparently was unlooted. Wolff carried a large stock of diamonds. It is believed robbers secured jewelry and money to the amount of \$1,700.

The crime was discovered by the night watchman who noticed that the storehouse light was not burning. He felt the door and it opened to his touch. Just at this juncture Mrs. Wolff, alarmed at the non-appearance of her husband, arrived on the scene. Suspecting that something was wrong, the watchman told Mrs. Wolff to remain outside while he investigated. Turning on the store light, a horrible scene confronted him. Blood was everywhere and on the floor in a back room lay Wolff's terribly mangled body.

The only clue found on the premises was a blood-stained collar and necktie.

RHODA A. THOMPSON DEAD.

Was Last Real Daughter of the American Revolution.

Woodbury, Conn., May 1.—Miss Rhoda Augusta Thompson, the last real daughter of the American Revolution, died at her home here today following a paralytic stroke. Her father, a Revolutionary hero, was killed in the battle of the Clouds.

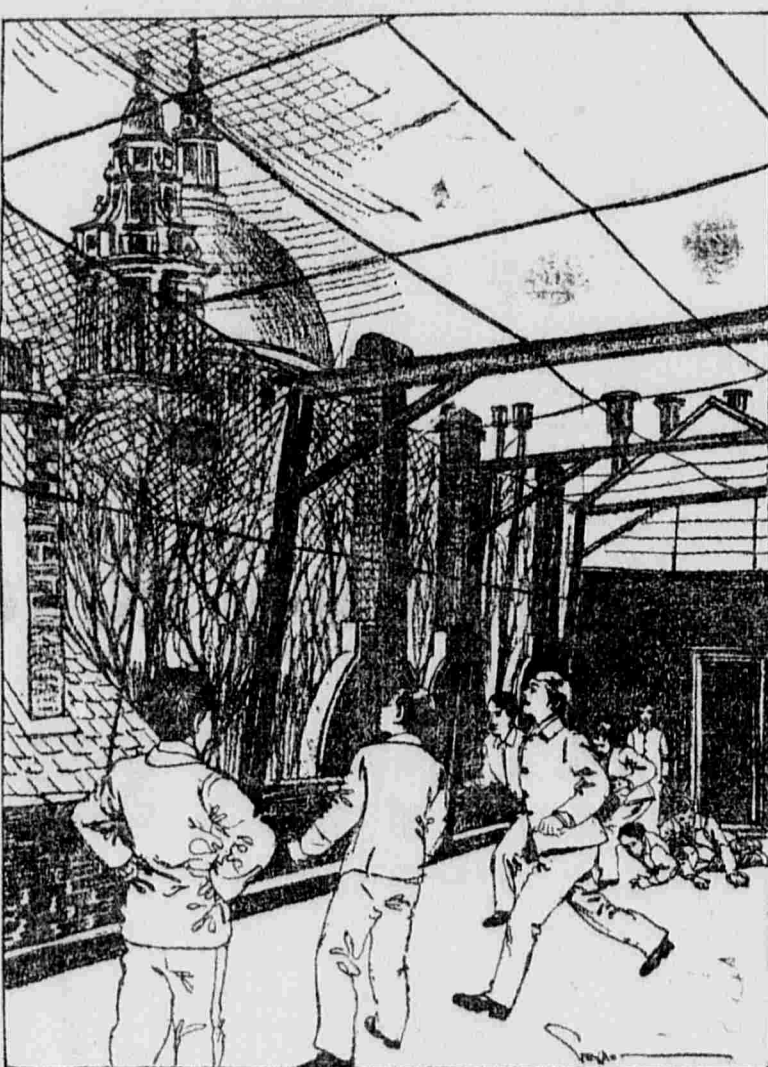
Miss Thompson was born at Woodstock, N. Y., in June, 1821, and was the youngest of 17 children.

CATTLE ON THE WESTERN RANGE

American Humane Association Appeals to President Roosevelt in Their Interest.

SAYS RANGE OVERCROWDED.

Would Have Fair and Equitable Lease Or Grazing Land Compelling Owners to Provide Sustenance.

Washington, May 1.—An appeal has been made to President Roosevelt by the American Humane association in the interests of the cattle that graze on the western ranges. In a petition to the chief executive the association endorses the president's efforts to obtain proper federal control of the public domain, especially the grazing privileges thereon. It is claimed that the government report show that over two and a half million deaths from exposure of sheep and cattle occurred during the year ending March 31, 1905.

It is held that the wholesale perishing of range animals on western plains is due to starvation and thirst caused by overcrowding and abuse of the public ranges. To prevent this the association recommends the passage of a fair and equitable lease or grazing law providing that the owners of all stock grazing under lease shall provide stock with the proper summer and winter sustenance. "In the name of civilization and humanity," the petition reads, "we appeal to you, Mr. president to find a way as you have been known to do on previous occasions, to expedite the slow process of public education on this subject and quicken the public conscience."

CONCENTRATING TROOPS

Honduras Reported to be Massing Her Forces on the Guatemalan Frontier In Anticipation of Trouble.

Panama, May 1.—It is reported that Honduras is concentrating her forces on the Guatemalan frontier. Passengers who have arrived here recently from Guatemala say that a revolution was being planned against the Honduran government by Gen. Domingo Vazquez, ex-president of Honduras, who is supposed to have the support of Guatemala. This they say was the reason why Senor Bustillos, finance minister of Honduras was sent on a special confidential mission to President Cabrera of Guatemala and why Cabrera, instead of treating with Bustillos, practically imprisoned him in Guatemala City.

After the latest was with Nicaragua, Honduras was left entirely disarmed, and should the revolution of the Honduran military movements prove true, it is supposed that Nicaraguans and Salvadorans have furnished her with munitions of war.

The situation in Guatemala is reported to be exceedingly critical. The passengers reported that among the persons who were being treated with respect there were Mrs. Gustafson and Mrs. Blanco and Messrs. Herrera, Trigueros, Eduardo Rubio and Antonio Rubio, all of whom belong to prominent wealthy Central American families. During the past year all these persons had been imprisoned in the dungeon of the penitentiary in Guatemala City and the passengers say that it was impossible for them to have participated in the recent attempt on the life of President Cabrera. They add that the executions were considered cruel and unnecessary, and that the relatives of those persons put to death, who are rich and powerful will not rest until they have succeeded in bringing about the downfall of Cabrera.

COMMODITY CLAUSE IN EFFECT FROM NOW ON

Washington, May 1.—The time of the senate was taken up for two hours today with a speech by Senator Jeff Davis of Arkansas, asking that the committee on the judiciary be discharged from further consideration of his bill for the suppression of trusts. The remainder of the day was given over to consideration of a resolution by Senator Elihu Root of New York, relative to the commodity clause of the Hepburn railroad rate law. The resolution provoked so much debate and so many amendments were offered that the whole matter went over until Monday, as tomorrow will be given over to eulogies for the late senators from Florida.
