

MEETING OF THE CITY SAGES

A Little More Than \$4000 a Mile for
the Proposed Boulevard.

ANOTHER FIREPROOFING SCHEME

An Extension of the Warm Springs
Lease Asked.—Catch Basin Seeded,
—Other Matters.

The City Council held an adjourned session last night. At 8 o'clock President Leesfield had not yet put in an appearance and Councilman Henry was called to the chair. The members present were Heiss, Wantland, Beadle, Simonds, Evans, Kelly, Lowman, Bell, Karrick, Fulton, Moran, Horn.

Before the record closed reading the minutes, Leesfield entered and Henry vacated the chair in his favor.

The Proceedings.

Henry A. Rebenich asked that Releiford road be graded and gravelled, beginning at Ninth North street and running south, crossing North Temple and streets with them. Committee on streets.

Gibb & Knight asked that they be allowed to connect their premises with the city sewer system. Committee on sewers.

ANOTHER FIREPROOFING SCHEME.
Mausund, Hirt & Proudfit, architects, sent in a communication or which the following is a copy:

Gentlemen—At the request of several members of your honorable body for a statement to be made at the meeting of councilmen, held in Salt Lake on the 1st instant, I beg to inform you that the county road has been laid down from the intersection of Main and First streets east to the intersection of Main and Second Streets, and the same has been graded and paved with stone and asphaltum, and the cost of paving shall have been borne by the city.

COST OF THE BOULEVARD.

The city engineer reported upon the amount of money required to lay over the route proposed by himself at the last meeting, as follows:

Between Main Street and West Main, 8th and 9th Streets, one mile, \$3,000.00 per acre, or \$27,000.00 per acre, and 10th and 11th Streets, \$2,000.00 per acre, or \$22,000.00 per acre. Total cost, \$49,000.00.

From northeast corner of 10th and Main Streets to intersection of Main, First and Second Streets, \$2,000.00 per acre, or \$18,000.00 per acre. Total cost, \$18,000.00.

From intersection of Main and Second Streets to West Main, \$10,000.00 per acre, or \$90,000.00 per acre. Total cost, \$100,000.00.

The above includes the cost of necessary drains and of engineering, but not of means to sprinkle. Committee on streets.

SUBSIDY CHARTERED.

Street Supervisor Hines recommended that one-half-mile be constituted on Second South and Second West streets, running north and south in front of the county court house; also on First and Second Streets, running east and west. There are three car tracks on the street. Committee on streets with power to act.

TO PROTECT THE SHEARLS OF THE YOUNG.

The city attorney submitted an ordinance prohibiting boys under 23 years of age to visit saloons or play pool or billiards thereon. Committee on streets.

LONGHORSE LEAVES THE CHAIR.

At this juncture of the council proceedings a messenger entered the council chamber and called President Leesfield from the chair which he vacated in favor of Tracy and had the chair removed.

PRIVATE FLAGGING SIDEWALK.

The Salt Lake Dramatic association asked permission to lay their own flagging sidewalks. Board of public works.

WARM SPRINGS LEASE.

Most Barnes and Dykes leases of the Warm Springs were given in a communication in which they requested that they had made permanent improvements greatly in excess of the value of those agreed upon in their lease. The value of such improvements is placed at \$10,000.00. That the sort of competing in other places of like kind, which are being built, greatly improved and repaired, it was necessary to make further improvements on old property to the extent of \$10,000.00. On this showing they asked for an extension of their lease and submitted a form of contract to be entered into with the city.

On motion of Wantland the committee was directed to make permanent improvements on public grounds with instructions to ascertain what a relinquishment of the present lease could be secured for in case the city should decide to establish public baths at the Warm Springs.

FORT DOUGLAS SEWAGE.

William Cheshire and others asked that the sewage of Fort Douglas be emptied into the city sewer. Committee on sewers.

OLD WOOLEN MILLS.

W. H. Chase asked to lease the old woolen mills property at the mouth of City Creek canyon. Committee on public grounds.

MEDICAL EXPERT'S BILL.

Dr. G. W. Foster sent in a bill as medical expert as follows:

For visiting garage deposited at Higgin's, \$25; two days' attendance at trial, \$10; expenses, \$10. Total, \$45.

TO MAKE BLUE PRINTS.

The city engineer reported that in order to make blue prints as the council and departments require, he needed a large-sized printing apparatus, so that such work could be done at a reasonable cost, which is not now possible. Died and the purchase authorized.

The city engineer reported that according to the instructions of the council it should be the duty of public works requesting the preparation of plans and specifications for building the boulevard, so that the public would be compelled to pay for the boulevard. It is therefore asked that the contractor, materials and methods of construction be left to the engineer and engineer of that the contractor selects from the plans shown, no accompanying bill of material, the contractor and his employer which should meet with the contractor's approval.

ANNUAL REPORTS.

The city engineer called attention to the importance of the annual reports for 1892 printed at once. The matter, together with the bill submitted some time ago, was referred to the committee on accounts.

CATCH BASIN WANTED.

The city engineer said the following: "The city engineer, accompanied by his indications of route, are more excellent, especially as regards the cost of the work, than the steep approach to the marsh for a pleasant drive when safety is a consideration. Good roads on bridges and embankments might considerably diminish the cost of the boulevard, but the weight of traffic, and the result, would become costly and hard when the road fails to be reasonably heavy. Therefore, the cost of the boulevard would be increased."

Better, it is possible, have our boulevard constructed a grade that would not require any cutting of the marsh, over 40 feet in width, and construct it round about, without necessarily cutting or the danger of being pitched over their houses heads, and sending them into the water in advance of a hill considerably in height.

No collection is intended to be cast upon the city engineer. He has undoubtedly but somewhat interested in the matter of cost, and the route indicated by him is the best.
