Burlington should be financed they met unexpected difficulties, although it was agreed by both sides, it is said, that a proprietory company should be organized for this purpose, as well as another proprietary company for Great Northern and Northern Pacific. There was a disposition on the part of the Union Pacific to surrender its North-

ern Pacific stock in exchange for shares in a new proprietary company. but members of the Harriman syndi-cate objected to paying a large amount of cash for a one-half interest in the Burlington. The price of \$200 a share was though

to be too large, and if all cash were paid for the Burlington it would be an outlay of \$200,000,000, which was en-tirely different from what the Harripeople had in mind. It was said today that the most likely way out of the difficulty would be the surrender of the Union Pacific holdings

of Northern Pacific in exchange for an interest in Burlington. The former are about \$77,000,000 par value and are said to have cost something more than frat

figure. But if the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern accepted the exchange the Northern Pacific company would be buying its own stock.
