"There Were Giants in Those Days."

The Bible mentions several races of giants, as the Rephaeim, the Anakims, the Enims, the Zonzonians, and others. Profane history also mentions giants; they have seven feet of height to Hercules, their first hero, and in our days we have seen men eight feet high. The tallest man who was shown in a house in 1785, measured eight feet seven inches. The Emperor Maximilian was of that size; Stenkius and Platner, physiologists of the last century, saw several of that stature, and Goliath, the giant of Gath, was nine feet high.

The body of Orestes, according to the Greeks, was eleven feet and a half; the giant Galban, brought from Arable to Rome, under Claudius Caesar, was near ten feet; and the bones of Scourvilles and Puffo, kept in the church of Sallust, were but six inches shorter.

Funnam, a Scotman, who lived in the time of Eugene the Second, King of Scotland, measured eleven feet and a half; and Jacob Malin, in his voyage to the Straits of Magellan, reported in 1519, that Point Desire several graves covered with stones; and having the curiosity to remove the stones, they discovered human skeletons of ten and eleven feet long.

The Chevalier Soucy, in his voyage to the Indies, in 1614, says that, among the things found in the sepulchral caverns of that mountain, the head of a Glaucine, which had eighty teeth, and the body was not less than fifteen feet long.

Hannibal, the celebrated anatomist, who died in 1614, says that, some years before, there was to be seen in the suburbs of St. Germain the tomb of the giant Isoret, who was twenty feet high.

In 1626, in 1650, in digging in the ditch near the Dominican, the Franciscan tomb containing a skeleton whose skull held a bushel of corn, and whose shin bone reached up to the girdle of the tallest man there, being about four feet long, and consequently the body must have been seventeen or eighteen feet high. Upon another place of a giant upon whom was engraved: "In this tomb lies the noble and puissant Lord, the Chevalier Rion de Vallemont, and his bones." Platner, a famous physician, declares that he saw at Luttre the true human bones of a subject which had been at least ninetieth feet high.

Valence, in Dauphine, boasts of possessing the bones of the giant Bucar, tyrant of the Vivars, who was slain by an arrow by the Count de Cabillon, his vassal. The Dominican had a part of the shin bone, with the skeleton in front, with an inscription showing that this giant was twenty-two and a half feet high, and that his bones were found in 1705, near the banks of the Mordier, a little river at the foot of the mountains of Crussol, upon which, tradition says, the giant dwelt.

January 11, 1613, some masons digging near the ruins of a castle in Dauphine, in a field which, by tradition, had long been called the Giant's Field, at the depth of eighteen feet, discovered a black tomb, thirty feet long, two feet wide, and five feet high, in which was a gray stone, with the words "Theutobodus Rex" cut thereon. When the tomb was opened, they found a human skeleton entire, twenty-five and a half feet long, ten feet across the shoulders, and five feet deep from the breastbone to the neck. His teeth were about the size of an ox's hoof, and his shin-bone measured four feet.

Near Mezirian, in Sicily, in 1616, was found a giant, thirty feet high; his head was the size of a hogback, and each of his teeth weighed five ounces.

Near Palermo, in the valley of Mount Etna, in Sicily, a skeleton of giant, thirty feet long, was found in the year 1548; and another of thirty-three feet high, in 1550; and many curious persons have preserved several of these gigantic bones.

The Athenians found near their city, two famous skeletons, one of thirty-four, and the other of thirty-one.

At Toto, in Bohemia, in 1783, was found a skeleton, the head of which could scarce be encompassed by the arms of two men together, and whose legs, which they still keep in the castle of that city, were 26 feet long.

The skull of the giant found in Mezirian, September, 1861, held 210 pounds of meat.

The celebrated Dr. Hans Sloane, who treated this matter very learnedly, does not doubt these facts, but thinks the bones were those of elephants, whales, or other enormous animals.

Elphant's bones may be shown for the size of giants, but they can never impose on connoisseurs.

Whales, which by their immense bulk are more proper to be substituted for the largest giants, have neither arms nor legs, and the head of that animal has not the least resemblance to that of a man. Therefore, therefore, that a great number of the gigantic bones which we have mentioned have been seen by anatomists, and have been reputed real human bones, the existence of giants is proved—*Ex-charge.*

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
